



### **Intended Use**

The Waters<sup>®</sup> 2695 Separations Module can be used for in-vitro diagnostic testing to analyze many compounds, including diagnostic indicators and therapeutically monitored compounds. When developing methods, follow the "Protocol for the Adoption of Analytical Methods in the Clinical Chemistry Laboratory," *American Journal of Medical Technology*, 44, 1, pages 30–37 (1978). This protocol covers good operating procedures and techniques necessary to validate system and method performance.

### **Biological Hazard**

When analyzing physiological fluids, take all necessary precautions and treat all specimens as potentially infectious. Precautions are outlined in "CDC Guidelines on Specimen Handling," *CDC–NIH Manual*, 1984.

### Calibration

Follow acceptable methods of calibration with pure standards to calibrate methods. Use a minimum of five standards to generate the standard curve. Concentration range should cover the entire range of quality-control samples, typical specimens, and atypical specimens.

### **Quality Control**

Routinely run three quality-control samples. Quality-control samples should represent subnormal, normal, and above-normal levels of a compound. Ensure that quality-control sample results are within an acceptable range, and evaluate precision day to day and run to run. Data collected when quality-control samples are out of range may not be valid. Do not report this data before ensuring that chromatographic system performance is acceptable.

# Chapter 1 Introduction to the Waters 2695 Separations Module




Figure 1-1 Waters 2695 XE Separations Module (Front View)

This chapter introduces you to the Waters<sup>®</sup> 2695 Separations Module (Figure 1-1). The Separations Module is an integrated solvent and sample management platform. This integration of two traditional high-performance liquid chromatography (HPLC) components—a solvent management system and a sample management system—streamlines all critical separations functions.

#### **Factory Configurations**

The Waters 2695 Separations Module is available from Waters in a number of configurations, differing from each other by the options that are included. These options are described in <u>Section 1.5, Options and Accessories</u>. The two *primary* configurations are designated:

- 2695 Provides quaternary solvent, high-performance solvent delivery, integral helium sparge for solvent conditioning, integral plunger seal-wash system, 120-vial capacity sample management system, liquid-crystal display and keyboard user interface, and floppy disk drive.
- 2695 XE Provides the capabilities of the 2695 base product, replaces the helium sparge system with a four-channel inline vacuum degasser, and adds a column heater and a sample heater/cooler.

#### **HPLC System Configurations**

The Separations Module supports RS-232, IEEE-488, and I/O connections for compatibility with a variety of HPLC system configurations. The Separations Module can function as:

- The source of I/O and timing signals in a simple, stand-alone HPLC system
- The IEEE-488 system controller in a stand-alone HPLC system using a Waters 2410 or 410 Refractive Index Detector and/or a Waters 2487 Dual Wavelength or Wasters 486 Tunable Absorbance Detector
- A component of an HPLC system controlled by the Millennium®<sup>32</sup> Chromatography Manager, the Micromass<sup>®</sup> MassLynx<sup>™</sup> software, or a data system using RS-232 communications

#### **Control of Chromatographic Parameters**

The Separations Module controls:

- Method programming
- Solvent composition
- Flow rate
- · Plunger seal wash flow
- · Needle-wash flow
- Sample injection
- Inline degassing
- External events

- · Operation of detectors over the IEEE-488 interface bus
- Column heating (if installed)
- Sample heating/cooling (if installed)
- Helium sparge rate (if installed)
- Binary code device (if installed)
- Bar code reader (if installed)

The Separations Module expands the traditional concept of an HPLC method to include all parameters that can influence a chromatographic separation. This approach takes a number of parameters such as pressure limits and syringe draw rates that are usually included in an instrument configuration and makes them part of the separation method. You can program the values of these parameters to change from method to method without having to set up the instrument before each run.

#### **Spill Protection**

All fluid-handling areas of the Separations Module contain spill protection; spilled solvent is routed to the waste line connectors below the front panel. A drip tray is provided for the top cover to provide leak protection if you decide to place a detector on top of the Separations Module. A solvent bottle tray provides storage for up to four 1-L solvent reservoirs and one 250-mL wash solvent reservoir and leak protection for up to a 2-L spill.

#### **Methods Storage and Retrieval**

The Separations Module can export to, and import separation methods, sample sets, and sample templates from, standard PC-formatted, 3.5-inch floppy diskettes using the built-in floppy diskette drive. This simplifies transfer of methods from system to system.

Note: The Waters 2695 Separations Module is immune to PC viruses.

#### **Record-Keeping Functions**

The Separations Module automatically records the following information:

- · Total number of injections
- Total solvent usage (pumped through the system)
- · System errors
- Programmed operating conditions for each run

You can:

- · Print this information on an attached printer
- Transfer this information to an external device using the RS-232 bus
- · Export this information to a floppy disk as an ASCII file

# 1.2 Solvent Management System Overview




Figure 1-2 Fluidic Path Through the Solvent Management System

The solvent management system blends and delivers solvents from the reservoir bottles to the sample management system in a pulse-free, low-dispersion flow path. The solvent management system incorporates a fluidic design that uses a serial flow path and two independently driven plungers for optimal flow control. This design requires only two check valves, enhancing reliability. Synchronized Composition Control<sup>™</sup> (SCC<sup>™</sup>) determines the gradient proportioning valve (GPV) actuation rate based on the selected flow rate, composition, and the piston volume. This results in excellent gradient composition accuracy and gradient precision. Figure 1-2 shows the fluidic path in the solvent management system.

#### **Flow Path**

The solvent flow in the solvent management system is as follows (Figure 1-2):

- 1. Solvent is sparged with helium in the reservoirs or is degassed by the inline vacuum degasser.
- 2. The gradient proportioning valve blends the solvents.
- 3. The blended solvents flow through the inlet check valve into the primary piston chamber while the accumulator piston delivers solvent under pressure to the system pressure transducer.
- 4. Just before the accumulator chamber empties, the solvent in the primary piston chamber is precompressed to a pressure slightly less than that indicated by the system pressure transducer.
- 5. When the accumulator piston chamber is empty, the primary piston delivers solvent under pressure through the primary pressure transducer, refills the accumulator

piston chamber, and delivers solvent under pressure through the system pressure transducer, while maintaining a constant flow through the system. The cycle repeats, beginning at step 3.

- 6. The system pressure transducer measures the operating pressure. A software algorithm compares the primary head pressure and the system pressure readings and regulates the precompression step to balance the pressures, providing a smooth, ripple-free flow.
- 7. Flow continues from the system pressure transducer outlet to the prime/vent valve and into an inline filter.
- 8. After passing through an inline filter, the solvent flow proceeds to the sample management system.

#### **Solvent Blending**

The gradient proportioning valve (GPV) blends up to four solvents in any combination you choose. The sum of the four solvents must equal 100%. The GPV produces predictable gradient segments regardless of solvent compressibility and system back pressure. Solvent selection and proportioning take place on the low-pressure (intake) side of the solvent delivery system. Solvents continue to blend in each of the piston chambers.

#### **Solvent Bottle Tray**

The solvent bottle tray holds up to four 1-L reservoirs and one 250-mL wash reservoir, and can contain a 2-L spill. The tray is sized to fit on top of the drip tray at the top of the Separations Module, as shown in <u>Figure 1-1</u>.

#### **Prime/Vent Valve**

The prime/vent valve allows you to attach a syringe with which you can draw solvent through the solvent management system.

#### **Plunger Seal-Wash System**

The seal-wash solvent lubricates the plunger and flushes away any solvent or dried salts forced past the plunger seal from the high-pressure side of each piston chamber. This wash cycle extends the life of the seals. The plunger seal wash system operates as follows:

- 1. Plunger seal wash solvent flows from a reservoir to the solenoid wash pump, and then to a cavity behind the main plunger seal in the primary head.
- 2. Flow continues out of the head and into the cavity behind the plunger seal in the accumulator head.
- 3. From the accumulator head, wash solvent flows to waste.

When the solvent management system is delivering solvent, the plunger seal wash pump intermittently circulates the wash solvent according to the time interval you select.

### **Loss of Prime Protection**

The Separations Module automatically stops when the operating pressure remains below 25 psi (1.7 bar, 172 kPa) for 50 cycles of the solvent delivery mechanics when a loss of prime occurs due to an empty solvent reservoir.

#### **Preferred Plunger Stroke Volume**

Based on comprehensive testing, the Separations Module uses discrete programmable stroke volumes that provide optimal flow delivery and solvent blending. To improve performance for specific applications, you can override the default (preprogrammed) stroke volume of 130  $\mu$ L by selecting a preferred stroke volume of 25  $\mu$ L, 50  $\mu$ L, or 100  $\mu$ L, as shown in <u>Table 1-1</u>. A larger stroke volume is recommended when using solvents which may require additional mixing (e.g. trifluoroacetic acid [TFA] gradients) which is afforded by a larger stroke volume. This additional mixing, unlike a static or dynamic mixer, occurs without added delay volume.

**Note:** If your Separations Module uses helium sparging, the 25-µL stroke volume is not available (either as a manual selection or as a preprogrammed set point) at low flow rates.

# 1.3 Sample Management System Overview

The sample management system holds and positions the sample vials and injects the samples into the solvent flow. The sample management system uses 5 carousels that each hold up to 24 sample vials, for a total of 120 vials. The vials are industry-standard 2-mL vials with snap-on, crimp-on, or screw-on caps. A carrier rotates the carousels to the injection station in the sample compartment.

#### **Flow Path**




Figure 1-3 Fluidic Path Through the Sample Management System

Four valves in the sample management system control the flow of solvent, sample, and needle wash solvent. These valves, designated V1 through V4, are shown in <u>Figure 1-3</u>. You can monitor the position of each valve in the Status screen (<u>Figure 4-4</u>).

The flow path through the sample management system changes according to the function being performed. Refer to Figure 1-3.

#### **Normal Flow**

During normal flow, V1 is open, allowing solvent to flow in two paths:

- 95 percent of the solvent flows through the body of V2, the sample loop pressure transducer, the sample loop, and needle. The needle is in the Stream position, and solvent flows out the needle port, through the seal pack, and out to the column.
- 5 percent of the solvent flows through the restrictor and the seal pack, and out to the column.

#### Injection

The injection cycle is performed in three steps:

- Isolating the sample loop from the normal flow V1, V2, and V3 close, then V4 opens, the needle wash pump turns on, and the needle moves to the Seal position. V2 and V3 then open to vent the sample loop pressure and to equilibrate the loop to atmospheric pressure.
- 2. **Sample withdrawal** V3 closes, the needle wash pump turns off, and the needle extends into the sample vial. The syringe plunger retracts, drawing the sample from the vial into the sample loop. The sample does not enter the syringe.

3. Sample injection – V2 closes, V3 opens, and the needle moves to the stream position to pressurize the sample loop. V1 opens, allowing the solvent to return to the normal flow. The solvent pushes the sample out of the sample loop, through the needle, and out to the column. The syringe returns to the home position, expelling drawn solvent to waste, and V3 closes.

#### **Carousel Configuration**

Each carousel is identified by color and letter and has a unique position on the carousel carrier. The Separations Module displays a warning if you attempt an injection with a carousel in the wrong position (refer to the Verify Carousel Placement parameter, <u>Section 3.2.1, Setting Configuration Parameters</u>). You can perform from 1 to 99 injections per sample vial, and you can offset the depth of the needle in the vial for small sample volumes, small injection volumes, or to compensate for variations in vial bottom thickness (<u>Table B-4</u>). Offsets may also be necessary when you use low-volume inserts in the sample vials.

Spills and condensation in the sample compartment are routed to a waste connection below the front panel.

You can load a carousel into the carrier while an injection is being made. An open-door sensor prevents the carrier from automatically advancing while you load a carousel.

#### **Vial Presence**

A light-emitting diode assembly checks for the presence of a vial before the needle moves to the Draw position. This prevents air from being accidentally injected into the solvent stream if a programmed vial position is accidentally left empty. Refer to the Verify vial presence parameter in <u>Section 3.2.1</u>, <u>Setting Configuration Parameters</u>.

### **Syringe Assembly**




Figure 1-4 Syringe Assembly

The syringe assembly is located behind a front panel door for ease of access, as shown in Figure 1-4. The Separations Module uses a standard 250- $\mu$ L syringe; as an option, you can install either a 25- $\mu$ L or 2500- $\mu$ L syringe. Refer to Section 7.3.3, Replacing the Syringe, for the procedure to change the syringe. Note that the Separations Module serial number is located on the syringe mounting plate.

# 1.4 Operating Configurations

The Separations Module can operate in three general control modes:

- System Controller mode
- No Interaction mode
- · Remote Control modes that include control by:
  - Waters Millennium Chromatography Manager (either Millennium version 2.xx or version 3.20 or later)
  - Micromass MassLynx software for Micromass mass spectroscopy detectors
  - RS-232 communications by non-Waters or non-Micromass data systems (mass spectroscopy systems, for example)
  - An external autosampler (the Waters 2700 Sample Manager, for example) with the Separations Module in the Operate Gradient by Event In mode

# 1.4.1 System Controller Mode

In this mode, the Separations Module functions as the HPLC system controller. You can perform runs manually or automatically in the System Controller mode. For a manual run, you input parameter values and selections through the front panel of the Separations Module. For an automatic run, you use separation methods, sample sets and/or sample templates to control the Separations Module. Refer to <u>Chapter 4</u>, Front Panel Control, for information on using the front panel to control runs. Refer to <u>Chapter 6</u>, <u>Creating Methods</u>, <u>Sample Sets</u>, and <u>Sample Templates</u>, for procedures to create and store separations methods, sample sets, and sample templates.

Depending on your system components, you can connect the Separations Module to other components using:

- IEEE-488 (digital) signal connections for Waters detectors
- I/O (analog) signal connections (hard wire cables)
- RS-232 (digital) signal connections for printers or integrators

Use the procedures described in <u>Chapter 4, Front Panel Control</u>, to control the HPLC system in the System Controller mode.

### **Digital Signal Connections for System Controller Operation**




Figure 1-5 Digital Signal Control of an HPLC System

<u>Figure 1-5</u> illustrates a typical HPLC system configuration where the Separations Module (in System Controller mode) uses only digital signal connections to control the HPLC system components.

In the System Controller mode, the Separations Module can control up to three detector channels on the IEEE-488 bus (two UV detector channels and one RI detector channel). The detectors are:

• Waters 2410 or 410 Differential Refractometer

• Waters 2487 Dual Wavelength or 486 Tunable Absorbance Detector (any combination of up to two channels)

In this type of system, you specify detector parameters in the detector table. During a run, commands such as to change wavelength or to change sensitivity are sent to the detector(s) at specified times. Refer to <u>Section 6.2.6</u>, <u>Setting Detector Parameters</u>, for details on setting up a detector table. The Separations Module does not process detector data. Detector results and other system data are sent directly to a data acquisition system, integrator, or chart recorder.

In addition to the IEEE-488 controlled detectors, you can use RS-232 and I/O connections to control other components that do not support the IEEE-488 interface bus.

Refer to <u>Section 2.7.2, Digital Signal Connections</u>, for details on making digital signal connections.

### 1.4.2 No Interaction Mode

In this mode, the Separations Module controls non-IEEE-488 devices in the HPLC system using the I/O connections on its rear panel. This mode disconnects the Separations Module from the IEEE-488 interface bus. Use this mode if you want to suspend communications with a connected Millennium Chromatography Workstation and operate system components from their front panels.

### Input/Output (I/O) Signal Connections for No Interaction Mode




Figure 1-6 I/O Signal Control of an HPLC System

<u>Figure 1-6</u> shows an example HPLC system configuration where the Separations Module controls the HPLC components through I/O signal connections.

In this type of system, you set up each HPLC component individually using its front panel. You connect these components to the Separations Module through the I/O connector. During a run, I/O signals from the Separations Module trigger synchronized or timed events in all the HPLC components. The Separations Module does not process detector data. Detector results and other system data are sent directly to a data acquisition system, integrator, or chart recorder. Refer to <u>Section 2.7.1, I/O Signal Connections</u>, for details on making I/O signal connections.

# 1.4.3 Remote Control Mode

In a remote control mode, the Separations Module and the other HPLC system components are controlled by the Millennium Chromatography Manager, by Micromass MassLynx software, by a non-Waters or non-Micromass data system using RS-232 (ASCII or binary) communications, or by an external autosampler with the Separations Module in the Operate Gradient by Event In mode.

In the Operate Gradient by Event In mode, the Separations Module is connected to an external autosampler (a Waters 2700 Sample Manager, for example). In this configuration, the Separations Module provides the gradient functionality for the system, and the external autosampler provides the sampling/injection functionality for the system. The external autosampler, which is connected to the I/O signal connector on the Separations Module, signals the Solvent Management System to begin a gradient. This mode does not allow the Separations Module to interface with instruments on the IEEE-488 interface bus.

Use the procedures in <u>Chapter 5, Making Automatic Runs</u>, to set up the Separations Module for remote control.

#### Millennium Control




Figure 1-7 Typical 2695 Separations Module HPLC System Under Millennium Chromatography Manager Control

<u>Figure 1-7</u> illustrates a typical HPLC system under the control of a Waters Millennium Chromatography Manager workstation.

You use Millennium software to create instrument methods and method sets to control the Separations Module and other HPLC system components. Refer to the Millennium documentation for more information on creating instrument methods and method sets.

All detectors currently supported by Millennium software can be used with the Separations Module, including the Waters 996/2996 Photodiode Array Detector. Data from the detectors are sent over the IEEE-488 interface bus to the Millennium software for processing.

#### MassLynx Control

When you control the Separations Module by MassLynx software, you use the MassLynx Inlet Editor to define operating parameters for the Separations Module and detector(s) (other than the mass spectrometer) used in the LC/MS system. Refer to the MassLynx documentation for more information on controlling the Waters 2695 Separations Module.

### **RS-232 Control**

To set parameters that remotely control the Separations Module from a data system that uses RS-232 (ASCII or binary) communications, refer to the documentation that comes with the data system.

#### **Operate Gradient by Event In Control**

**Note:** When you connect the Separations Module by its I/O terminal strip to an external autosampler using the Operate Gradient by Event In configuration, the external autosampler signals the Solvent Management System to begin a gradient. This mode does not allow the Separations Module to interface with instruments on the IEEE-488 bus.

# 1.5 Options and Accessories

A number of options for the 2695 Separations Module are available to suit your applications and site requirements. You can display a list of the hardware options that are installed in your Separations Module by pressing the Options screen key in the Configure screen. Refer to <u>Section 3.2, Configuring the Separations Module</u>, for details on displaying the Configure screen.

#### **Power Supply**

The 2695 Separations Module is factory equipped with a 600 watt (W) power supply. This provides immediate compatibility for the addition of a column heater/cooler.

The power supply by design is short circuit protected and does not feature external replacement fuses. The power supply is reset by power cycling the instrument.

Before adding a column heater/cooler to a Separations Module, contact your Waters Technical or Service representative at 800 252-4752, *U.S. and Canadian customers only.* Other customers, contact your local Waters subsidiary, or contact the Waters corporate headquarters in Milford, Massachusetts (U.S.A.).

#### **Column Heater**

The column heater allows you to maintain the column at temperatures from 5 °C above ambient (minimum of 20 °C) to 60 °C. An alarm warns you if the temperature varies outside of the range that you specify. The procedure to install this option is described in <u>Section 2.8.2</u>, Installing the Column Heater.

#### Sample Heater/Cooler

The sample heater/cooler allows you to maintain the sample compartment at temperatures from 4 to 40 °C for optimizing sample stability and/or solubility. This option is installed at the factory on the 2695 XE. The heater/cooler mounts through the rear panel of the Separations Module and uses four Peltier devices for temperature control.

#### **Bar Code Reader**

The bar code reader allows you to scan bar-coded sample vials to eliminate recording errors and add another level of sample traceability. A side panel covers the bar code reader to prevent exposure to the laser.

The Waters 2695 Bar Code Reader reads Code 128C labels, which specify a six-digit code that provides a scan range of one million numbers (000,000 to 999,999), with labels that fit on industry-standard 2-mL vials. The option also includes a roll of 2,500 labels that are specially coated to resist common chromatographic solvents. Attaching labels to the sample vials is the only step required to use the bar code reader.

#### PerformancePLUS Inline Degasser

The design of the PerformancePLUS<sup>™</sup> Inline Degasser combines a unique, variable-speed, continuously operating vacuum pump with innovative, high efficiency, low internal volume degasser chambers. This technology dramatically shortens instrument priming and equilibration times, allowing the system to become operational faster from an idle state or following a solvent change. Electronic control strategies are rugged, providing reliable long-term performance needed for continuous operation.

The degasser's Zero Hysteresis-Constant Run stepping motor-driven vacuum pump has been specifically designed and developed for membrane degassing of HPLC mobile phases. The continuously running pump cycles between high speeds, to provide rapid vacuum pull-down, while the low speed sustains a consistent vacuum level. This approach enables rapid vacuum equilibration for faster eluent equilibration. The continuous operating mode improves chromatographic performance for many high-sensitivity applications by eliminating the detector baseline drift or cycle that may be caused by pump hysteresis in discontinuous operating modes.

The PerformancePLUS Inline Degasser chambers achieve degassing efficiencies comparable to large-volume chambers, but with a fraction of the volume. Reduced from <11 mL to <500 uL, the degasser's low-volume chambers substantially reduce prime effort, speed up solvent changover, and increase reliability.

#### **Degasser Considerations**

Degassing efficiency is based upon the solvent gas load and the length of time that the solvent remains in its respective vacuum chamber. Gas removal efficiency decreases as the solvent flow rate increases because the solvent is in the vacuum chamber for less time. Using a normal analytical flow rate range of 0.000 to 5.000 mL/min, the degasser removes most of the dissolved gasses. Because you can perform dry and wet priming in the Separations Module at flow rates greater than 5.000 mL/min, you need to expose the solvents to the degasser vacuum for a short time (after priming) at zero flow rate. This solvent equilibrating process is described in the <u>"Equilibrating Solvents in the Vacuum Degasser"</u> discussion in <u>Section 4.4.2, Performing a Wet Prime</u>.

#### Vacuum Degasser Pressure Transducers

Waters 2695 Separations Modules come equipped with an absolute pressure transducer (APT). The APT is unaffected by altitude or barometric changes. <u>Table 1-1</u> lists the attributes of APT-equipped Separations Modules.

#### **Syringes**

You can install a 25- $\mu$ L, 250- $\mu$ L, or 2500- $\mu$ L sample syringe in the Separations Module. The 250- $\mu$ L syringe is standard. Refer to <u>Section 7.3.3, Replacing the Syringe</u>, for the procedure to replace the syringe.

#### Sample Loops

You can install an additional 100- $\mu$ L sample loop or a larger sample loop to inject sample volumes greater than 100  $\mu$ L. Refer to <u>Section 2.8.1, Installing an Optional Sample Loop</u>, for the procedure to install an optional sample loop.

### **Column Switching Valves**

The column switching valve is a motorized valve that enables the system to switch solvent flow to one of several columns. The switching valve is typically mounted in the Separations Module column heater (a stand-alone model is also available). The I/O function of the Separations Module controls the stand-alone Column valve.




Figure 1-8 2695 Column Heater with 3-Column Selection Valve Installed

The column-selection value is usually mounted in the 2695 Column Heater (Figure 1-8), and is either factory-installed, or installed as an add-on option at a later time.

The 2695 has four column-selection valve options, as described in Table 1-2:

The 2695 software automatically detects the presence and type of column selection valve at power on. You can specify column selection:

- Using the front panel (Section 4.4, Performing Direct Functions, Table 4-1)
- Through the separation method (<u>Section 6.1, Creating and Editing Separation</u> <u>Methods</u>)
- As part of a function in the sample set method (<u>Section 6.3, Creating and Editing a</u> <u>Sample Set</u>)

The 2695 Status screen shows the currently selected column or flow path for only those valves detected by the 2695 software.

#### **Two-Column Switching Valve**

The 2-column selection valve (6 port, 2 position) option is not recognized or supported by the 2695 firmware. This option is controlled by using one of the four I/O event switches on the rear panel of the 2695 Separations Module. One column is selected by turning the switch to the Off position, and the second column is selected by turning the choosing the On position.

#### **Three-Column Selection Valve**

The 3-column selection valve allows you to select any of three column positions. The 3-column selection valve is preconfigured before shipment, but you can reconfigure it. For more information, see <u>Section 2.6.8</u>, <u>Connecting the Column-Selection Valve</u>.

#### Six-Column Selection Valve

The 6-column selection valve allows you to select any one of six column positions, and you can specify any position as bypass or waste. For more information, refer to <u>Section 2.6.8</u>, <u>Connecting the Column-Selection Valve</u>.

#### **Two-Column Regeneration Valve**

The 2-column regeneration valve allows you to perform LC operations using one column while the second column is undergoing regeneration by a second solvent delivery system. For more information, refer to <u>Section 2.6.8</u>, <u>Connecting the Column-Selection Valve</u>.

#### **BCD Module**


The BCD (Binary Coded Decimal) option provides sample tracking by automatically transmitting vial numbers in BCD format from the Separations Module to a non-Waters or non-Micromass data system (typically a LIMS system).


# Chapter 2 Installing the 2695 Separations Module

This chapter describes how to make power, fluidic, and signal connections to the Waters 2695 Separations Module, and how to add hardware options.

# 2.1 Installation Overview

Figure 2-1 shows the major steps in installing the Separations Module.





#### **Required Materials**

- #2 Phillips screwdriver
- Flat-blade screwdriver
- 5/16-inch open-end wrench

- Tubing cutter
- 2695 Separations Module Startup Kit

Once you install the Separations Module, proceed to <u>Chapter 3, Preparing the 2695</u> Separations Module for Operation.

# 2.2 Site Requirements

Install the Separations Modules at a site that meets the specifications indicated in <u>Table 2-1</u>.

**Attention:** To avoid overheating the Separations Module, provide at least 2 inches (5 cm) of clearance at the rear of the Separations Module.




Figure 2-2 Typical System Dimensions

The top panel of the Separations Module can support the weight of two detectors, the detector drip tray, and the solvent bottle tray with four filled solvent bottles. Be sure to provide leak protection below any fluid-carrying units you place on top of the Separations Module.

# 2.3 Firmware and Software Requirements

The Waters detectors that connect to the Waters 2695 Separations Module must meet minimum firmware requirements to successfully communicate with the version 2.00 software installed in the Separations Module. Similarly, the external remote management system that controls the Separations Module must also meet minimum software

requirements. Refer to <u>Table 2-2</u> and <u>Table 2-3</u> for details on minimum firmware and software requirements, as appropriate.

# 2.4 Unpacking

The Separations Module is shipped in a single carton on a wooden pallet. Save the carton and pallet in case you decide to transport or ship the unit in the future. External accessories and options such as columns, column heater, and detectors are shipped in separate cartons.

To unpack the Separations Module:

1. Remove the bands securing the carton to the pallet. Remove the carton, the carousel box, the solvent bottle tray, the Startup Kit, and packing material.

2. Check the contents of the carton against the packing slip to confirm that all items are included.



**Attention:** To avoid injury, ensure that at least two people lift the Separations Module from the pallet to the bench.

- 3. Lift the Separations Module from the pallet and place it at the site you have chosen for installation.
- 4. Inspect all items for damage. Immediately report any shipping damage to both the shipping company and your Waters representative. Contact Waters Customer Service at 800 252-4752, U.S. and Canadian customers only. Other customers, call your local Waters subsidiary, or call the Waters corporate headquarters in Milford, Massachusetts (U.S.A.). Refer to Waters Licenses, Warranties, and Support for complete information on shipping damages and claims.

Continue the installation by following the procedures in <u>Section 2.5, Making Power</u> <u>Connections</u>.

# 2.5 Making Power Connections

Proper operation of the 2695 Separations Module requires that the AC power supply is grounded and has no abrupt voltage fluctuations.



*Caution:* To avoid electrical shock and possible injury, remove the power cord from the rear panel of the instrument before you perform the procedure in this section.

# 2.5.1 Making the Power Supply Connection

The Separations Module automatically adjusts for mains input voltages in two ranges:

- 85 to 132 Vac, 47 to 63 Hz
- 180 to 250 Vac, 47 to 63 Hz

To make the power supply connection:

- 1. Check that the Power On/Off switch is in the Off (0) position.
- 2. Connect the power cord to the connector on the rear panel of the Separations Module.
- Connect the other end of the power cord to a properly grounded ac power supply. Do not power on the Separations Module until you have completed all fluidic and signal connections.




Figure 2-3 Rear Panel of the 2695 Separations Module

# 2.6 Making Fluidic Connections




Figure 2-4 Steps to Making Fluidic Connections

Figure 2-4 summarizes the major steps in making fluidic connections to the Separations Module.

**Attention:** To ensure proper drip protection, be sure that the retaining screws in the solvent delivery and solvent conditioning trays are tightened before you operate the system.




Figure 2-5 Fluidic Connections in the Separations Module

<u>Figure 2-5</u> shows the locations of the solvent and sparge tubing, the connections for sparge gas, and the waste connections.

Before you can make any tubing connections:

- 1. Uncoil the sparge and solvent lines stored behind the solvent conditioning tray access door, as shown in Figure 2-5.
- 2. Unclip the tubing clips and install the tubing behind the clips. Close the clips to secure the tubing.
- Route the tubing so that the solvent conditioning tray door closes over the tubing, then route the tubing up the left side of the Separations Module to the solvent bottle tray.

# 2.6.1 Installing the Detector Drip Tray

If you want to position the detector on top of the Separations Module, mount the detector drip tray (Figure 1-1) at the front of the top panel of the Separations Module. To connect the drip tray outlet:

- Cut a piece of 3/16-inch ID tubing (from the Startup Kit) to a length of about 10 in. (25 cm).
- 2. Press the 3/16-inch barbed fitting (from the Startup Kit) into the drain hole in the bottom of the drip tray.
- 3. Attach the tubing to the fitting on the bottom of the drip tray.
- 4. Remove the backing from the adhesive pads on the bottom of the drip tray.
- 5. Open the syringe access door.
- 6. Pass the tubing through the hole in the top panel (Figure 2-7) and into the syringe compartment. Position the end of the tubing on the drip tray below the syringe compartment.
- Mount the drip tray so the adhesive pads adhere to the top cover of the Separations Module (<u>Figure 1-1</u>).

**Note:** To maintain adequate solvent head pressure and improve solvent delivery, position the solvent reservoirs above the level of the solvent management system.

# 2.6.2 Installing Solvent Supply Tubing

tray.

The tubing from the Separations Module to the solvent reservoirs is stored behind the solvent conditioning tray access door on the front panel (Figure 2-5). One end of the solvent tubing is connected (at the factory) to either the:

Mount the solvent bottle tray on the top of the Separations Module (left side). You
can place up to four 1-L reservoirs and one 250-mL reservoir in the solvent bottle

- Gradient proportioning valve (GPV) (if the sparge valve is installed)
- Inline vacuum degasser (if the vacuum degasser is installed) which is connected to the GPV

Each tube is marked with a letter (corresponding to each solvent reservoir) and a color-coded label. <u>Table 2-4</u> lists the letter and color code for each solvent line.

To install the solvent lines:

- 1. Remove the filter from each solvent line and insert the free end of each solvent line through a reservoir cap (from the Startup Kit).
- 2. Reinstall a filter on the end of each solvent line.
- 3. Install each reservoir cap on the appropriate reservoir. Make sure the solvent line reaches to the bottom of the reservoir.

# 2.6.3 Making Sparge Gas Connections

If the inline degasser is not installed in your system, you need to install the sparge gas inlet line before you begin to operate the Separations Module. The sparge gas outlet lines for each solvent reservoir are stored behind the solvent conditioning tray access door. Each sparge gas outlet line is marked with a letter (corresponding to each solvent reservoir) and a color-coded label. <u>Table 2-5</u> lists the letter and color code for each of the sparge gas outlet lines.

Waters recommends that you use an ultra-pure-carrier (UPC) grade of helium as the sparge gas to prevent solvent contamination.



Attention: To avoid damaging the Separations Module and possibly voiding the warranty, use only helium with contamination levels matching the limits in <u>Table 2-6</u>.

**Note:** The Waters 2695 Separations Module is shipped with a 1/8-inch NPT fitting (attached to coiled copper tubing) for connecting the sparge gas inlet to a 50 to 90 psi (3.5 to 6.3 kg/cm<sup>2</sup>) helium supply. You need to supply the high-pressure regulator that must be installed between the helium tank and the sparge gas inlet.



**Caution:** To avoid exposure to solvent vapors, connect the reservoir vent tubes to a suitable fume hood. Check local building and health codes for specific requirements regarding the venting of solvent vapors.

To install the sparge supply and vent lines:

1. At the front of the Separations Module, locate the coiled copper tubing with attached 1/8-inch NPT fitting and attach the fitting to your pressure-regulated helium supply.

- Remove the diffusers from the ends of the color-coded sparge lines that you plan to use.
- 3. Remove the reservoir cap from each reservoir that you plan to sparge.
- 4. Insert each sparge line through the appropriate reservoir cap and reinstall the diffusers.




Figure 2-6 Installing Sparge Lines in a Solvent Reservoir

- 5. Install the caps onto the reservoirs, and ensure that the diffuser is completely immersed in solvent, as shown in <u>Figure 2-6</u>.

- 6. Install a length [4-foot (1.2 m) *minimum*] of fluorinated-ethylene-propylene (FEP) tubing (from the Startup Kit) from each reservoir to a suitable fume hood. This tubing vents the solvent vapors out of the reservoir. Be sure the end of this tubing remains above the fluid level in the reservoir, as shown in <u>Figure 2-6</u>.
- 7. Install a diffuser (from the Startup Kit) onto the end of the tubing in the fume hood to maintain a positive pressure inside the tubing.

# 2.6.4 Installing the Degasser Vent Tubing

In addition to removing dissolved gases from the solvents, the degasser draws off solvent vapors, which may condense to form droplets in the exhaust system. The degasser exhausts these gases and droplets, if any, through a vent line.

*Caution:* To avoid exposure to solvent vapors, connect the degasser exhaust tube to a suitable fume hood. Check local building and health codes for specific requirements regarding the venting of solvent vapors.

To install the degasser vent tubing, place the free end of the degasser vent tubing in a waste container that is in a properly functioning fume hood.



*Caution:* To maintain proper vacuum system operation, do not allow the vent line to become submerged. Waters recommends that the degasser vent tubing not be placed in the solvent waste reservoir.

# 2.6.5 Making Waste Line Connections

You need to make waste line connections for:

- Spill tray waste
- Condensation waste



Attention: Ensure all drain lines, both inside the instrument and out, are properly connected and are not restricted by obstructions or bends. The two main drain lines exiting the front of the instrument must lay flat on the bench top without any upward travel. These drain lines must be ported to an appropriate waste container of a volume equal to or greater than that of the combined volume of all solvent reservoirs. The waste container must be at a level lower than the instrument. Always check the drain lines after moving the instrument or performing maintenance on the instrument.

### **Spill Tray Waste Line**

The spill tray waste outlet is located under the front panel of the Separations Module, below the solvent conditioning tray access door (Figure 2-5).

To install the spill tray waste line:

- 1. Cut a length of 3/16-inch ID tubing (from the Startup Kit) long enough to reach from the spill tray waste outlet to the front of the bench.
- 2. Connect one end of this piece of tubing to the spill tray waste outlet.
- 3. Install a 90° elbow (from the Startup Kit) on the other end of the tubing.
- 4. Cut another length of 3/16-inch ID tubing long enough to reach from the elbow fitting to the waste reservoir.
- 5. Connect the tubing between the elbow and the waste reservoir.

### **Condensation Waste Line**

The condensation waste outlet from the sample compartment is also located under the front panel of the Separations Module, to the right of the spill tray waste outlet. In addition

to condensate from the sample heater/cooler, the condensation waste can contain spills from broken sample vials.

To install the condensation waste line:

- 1. Cut a length of 3/16-inch ID tubing (from the Startup Kit) long enough to reach from the condensation waste outlet to the front of the bench.
- 2. Connect one end of this piece of tubing to the condensation waste outlet.
- 3. Install a 90° elbow (from the Startup Kit) on the other end of the tubing.
- 4. Cut another length of 3/16-inch ID tubing long enough to reach from the elbow fitting to the waste reservoir.
- 5. Connect the tubing between the elbow and the waste reservoir.

# 2.6.6 Installing Needle Wash and Plunger Seal Wash Reservoirs

The tubing for the needle wash and plunger seal wash reservoirs is located behind the solvent conditioning tray access door on the front panel (Figure 2-5). Each wash line is marked with a label and/or is color-coded. Table 2-7 lists the color code and size of each line. The plunger seal wash inlet line is labeled "Pump Wash In," and has a diffuser attached to one end.



**Attention:** To prevent damage to the Separations Module, be sure to use needle wash and plunger seal wash solutions that are miscible with the mobile phase you are using.



**Attention:** Use separate solutions and containers for plunger seal wash and needle wash. Because the functions of these solutions differ, the use of one solution for both functions may compromise the effectiveness of either needle washing or plunger seal washing.

To install the needle-wash and plunger seal-wash reservoirs:

- 1. Place the needle-wash reservoir and plunger seal-wash reservoir in a tray on top of the Separations Module.
- 2. Place the needle-wash inlet line (green) in the needle wash reservoir.
- 3. Place the needle-wash outlet line (yellow) and the sample loop waste line (clear) in a suitable waste container.
- 4. Remove the diffuser from the plunger seal-wash inlet line (clear, labeled Pump Wash In), insert the line through a reservoir cap, reinstall the diffuser on the end of the line, and install the cap on the plunger seal-wash reservoir.
- 5. Place the plunger seal-wash waste line (clear) in a suitable waste container.

# 2.6.7 Connecting the Column

The red outlet tubing of the sample management system, which connects to the column inlet, is located behind the right side panel.

**Note:** If you are connecting the Separations Module to a column switching valve, connect the red outlet tubing to the column switching valve inlet.

**Note:** If you are connecting the Separations Module to an external autosampler and configuring for Operate Gradient by Event In operation, connect the red outlet tubing to the inlet of the autosampler.

To connect the column:

- 1. Pass the red outlet tubing through the opening in the middle of the right side panel.
- 2. Connect the red outlet tubing to the column inlet. Tighten the fitting.




Figure 2-7 Side View of Frame Openings for Fluidic Connections (Side Panel Removed)

Two sets of column clips and M4  $\times$  10 screws are included in the Startup Kit. You can mount columns up to 7.9 mm OD and 15 cm long in the compartment behind the syringe door on the front panel by using the shorter clips. To use longer columns, mount the longer column clips so they protrude from the side of the Separations Module through the slots shown in Figure 2-7.

If the optional column heater is installed, refer to <u>Section 2.8.2</u>, <u>Installing the Column</u> <u>Heater</u>, for the procedure to connect the outlet tubing to the Column Heater.

# 2.6.8 Connecting the Column-Selection Valve

The 2695 is available with optional column-selection valves that allow you to switch the flow path among multiple columns:

- 3-column selection valve
- 6-column selection valve
- 2-Column Regeneration valve

#### **Two-Column Selection Valve**

The 2-Column (6 port, 2 position) Selection Valve is not available a factory installed option, but canbe ordered as a field installed option. Instuctions for connection the 2-Column Selection Valve are shipped with the option.

#### **Three-Column Selection Valve**




Figure 2-8 Three-Column Selection Valve Configuration (As Shipped)

The 3-column selection valve (Figure 2-8) is an eight-port, three-position valve preconfigured at the factory as follows:

- Port 1 Route to the column (2.1 mm × 50 mm column is supplied)
- Port 2 Route to waste
- Port 3 Route through a restrictor bypass to the detector

You can complete installation of the 3-column selection valve after you have installed the column heater (see <u>Section 2.8.2, Installing the Column Heater</u>).

#### **Required Material**

5/16-inch open-end wrench

#### Procedure

To connect the 3-column selection valve to the sample management system fluidic path:

- 1. Use the 5/16-inch wrench to connect the red line (from the 2795 inject valve) to the IN port on the column selection valve.
- 2. Use the tubing and fittings (supplied with the 3-column selection valve) to connect the OUT port of the column selection valve to the detector inlet.
- 3. Replace the stainless steel union shipped inside the column heater with the column (supplied with the valve, or another column of your choice).

4. Route the waste line (installed) from Port 2 of the column selection valve through the hole in the bottom of the column heater to a suitable waste reservoir.

You can reconfigure the 3-column selection valve as appropriate for your application.

#### **Six-Column Selection Valve**






Figure 2-9 Six-Column Selection Valve Connections (Example)

The 6-column selection valve is shipped separately with a coil of 0.010-in PEEK tubing, a 0.0025-inch ID restrictor tube, and Upchurch Sealtight<sup>™</sup> fittings. Connect as appropriate for your application (<u>Figure 2-9</u>).

**Note:** Any of the six column positions can be used for a restrictor or for waste as in the three-column selection valve (see the example in <u>Figure 2-8</u>).

### **Two-Column Regeneration Valve**

The 2-column regeneration valve is shipped separately with a coil of 0.010-inch PEEK tubing, a 0.0025-inch ID restrictor tube, and Upchurch Sealtight<sup>™</sup> fittings. Connect as appropriate for your application (see the example in <u>Figure 2-10</u>). Contact Waters Technical Service for more information.





### 2.6.9 Connecting the Detector

You can place the detector on either the top or the right-hand side of the Separations Module. If you place the detector on top of the Separations Module, be sure to install the drip tray using the procedure in <u>Section 2.6.1</u>, <u>Installing the Detector Drip Tray</u>.

To connect the detector:

- 1. Connect the outlet of the column to the inlet of the detector.
- 2. Connect a waste line from the detector outlet to a suitable waste container.



Attention: To avoid spill damage, use a drip tray below the fluid connections on the detector.

# 2.7 Signal Connections

The rear panel of the Separations Module (<u>Figure 2-3</u>) provides connection terminals and communication ports for operation with external devices.

The signal connections you need to make to your Separations Module depend on the:

- Operating mode you select for the Separations Module (System Controller, No Interaction, Remote, or Operate Gradient by Event In mode)
- Types of instruments that make up your HPLC system

This section describes the input/output (I/O) and digital signal connections that you can make from the terminal strips, RS-232 connectors, and IEEE-488 bus connector on the rear panel of the Separations Module.




Figure 2-11 Step to Making Signal Connections

Use <u>Figure 2-11</u> as an overview of the steps involved in making signal connections to the Separations Module.

# 2.7.1 I/O Signal Connections




Figure 2-12 I/O Signal Connectors

The rear panel includes two removable connectors (Figure 2-12) that hold the screw terminals for I/O signals. These connectors are keyed so that they can be inserted only one way.



Attention: To avoid the risk of damaging other components, do not remove the keys in the A and B connectors. These keys ensure that the A connector installs only in the right slot and the B connector installs only in the left slot (when you face the rear panel).

#### I/O Signals

#### **Event Switches**

You can use the eight terminals (Switches 1 through 4) on connector A as contact-closure switches to control column-switching valves, fraction collectors, or similar external devices. Each pair of Switch terminals (the two Switch 1 terminals, for example) is connected to an external device. You can operate the switches in either of two ways:

- Manually, from the Direct screen
- Automatically, in a separation method using the timed table in the I/O screen

Refer to <u>Section 6.2.5, Setting I/O Parameter Values</u>, for information on using switches in an automated run.

Table 2-10 describes the functions associated with each position of an event switch.

# 2.7.2 Digital Signal Connections

The rear panel includes two RS-232 interface connectors and one IEEE-488 interface connector for digital signal communications (<u>Figure 2-3</u>).

#### **RS-232 Connections**

The Separations Module is equipped with two DB-9 connectors, Port A and Port B (Figure 2-3). Port A is used for data output; Port B is a bidirectional port used to communicate with a third-party (non-Waters or non-Micromass) data system for remote operation.

#### Port A

Use Port A to transmit data to external devices (a Waters 746 Data Module or serial printer, for example) when the Separations Module is in the System Controller mode. You can transmit three types of data over this RS-232 interface:

- Print data When you press a Print screen key
- Report data When a report is generated
- Vial position data For use with the BCD option

<u>Table 2-11</u> lists the values of the RS-232 output data parameters that you can select in the Configuration screen. For more information on the Configuration screen, refer to <u>Section 3.2.1, Setting Configuration Parameters</u>.

#### Port B

Use Port B to connect to a non-Waters or non-Micromass data system that uses RS-232 (ASCII) communications to control the Separations Module. To enable this port, you choose **Controlled via RS232 (ASCII)** in the Configuration screen. For more information on the Configuration screen, refer to <u>Section 3.2.1, Setting Configuration Parameters</u>.

#### **IEEE-488 Connections**

Use the IEEE-488 interface connector (Figure 2-3) to connect the Separations Module to IEEE-488 devices, such as the:

- Waters 996/2996 PDA Detector
- Waters 2487, 486, 2410, and 410 Detectors
- busLAC/E card in a Millennium Chromatography Manager workstation, a network LAC/E module (Millennium version 2.15 or higher), or a LAC/E<sup>32</sup> Acquisition Server (Millennium<sup>32</sup> version 3.00 or higher)
- General Purpose Instrument Board in a Micromass MassLynx computer

The IEEE-488 connector in the Separations Module mates with a standard IEEE-488 cable



Attention: To avoid possible damage to components, power off all instruments connected to the IEEE-488 bus before you connect an IEEE-488 interface cable to an instrument.

Refer to Figure 1-5 for the signal connections (IEEE-488 and RS-232) in a typical HPLC system where the Separations Module functions as the System Controller. Refer to Figure 1-7 for the signal connections in a typical HPLC system with a Separations Module and Millennium Chromatography Manager.

#### Setting the IEEE-488 Address

Use the Configure screen to view or change the IEEE-488 address of the Separations Module. Refer to <u>Section 3.2.2</u>, <u>Configuring the Operating Mode</u>, for details on setting the IEEE-488 address.

# 2.8 Adding Hardware Options

Depending on your applications, you may want to install the following options on the Separations Module:

- Larger sample loop
- Column heater
- Larger or smaller syringe

- Bar Code Reader (this option is installed by a Waters Field Engineer)
- Column Switching Valve (refer to the installation sheet provided with the valve)
- BCD Module (refer to the installation sheet that comes with the module)

**Note:** An in-house LIMS specialist must be available to connect the BCD Module to your LIMS system.

# 2.8.1 Installing an Optional Sample Loop

To inject sample volumes greater than 100  $\mu L,$  you need to install an optional sample loop. This installation involves:

- Removing the right side panel
- Installing the sample loop
- Replacing the right side panel

#### **Required Materials**

- #2 Phillips screwdriver
- Wrenches, 5/16-inch, two
- Wrench, adjustable
- Sample Loop Option Kit
- Union (part number WAT097334)

#### **Removing the Right Side Panel**

To remove the right side panel:

- 1. Power off the Separations Module and disconnect the power cable.
- 2. If a column heater is installed, lift the column heater off the keyed ports and disconnect the column heater cable.
- 3. Use the Phillips screwdriver to remove the two screws that secure the right side cover.
- 4. Slide the side panel to the rear, off the posts on the rear panel.



**Caution:** To avoid possible injury, do not remove the cover plate on the side of the sample compartment.

### Installing the Sample Loop

To add a sample loop to the factory-installed 100-µL loop:




Figure 2-13 Disconnecting the Sample Loop

1. Use the 5/16-inch wrench to disconnect the sample loop from the pressure transducer, as shown in <u>Figure 2-13</u>.

- 2. Connect the open end of the existing sample loop to one end of the union. Connect the other end of the union to the new sample loop.
- 3. Connect the open end of the new sample loop to the pressure transducer.
- 4. Use the wrenches to tighten the connections.
- 5. Connect the power cable and power on the Separations Module.
- 6. Enter the new sample loop volume in the Configuration screen (<u>Section 3.2,</u> <u>Configuring the Separations Module</u>).
- Perform a purge and compression check to eliminate air bubbles and check for leaks. Refer to <u>Section 3.4.1, Purging the Sample Management System</u>, for the purge procedure.

To install a sample loop:

- 1. Use the 5/16-inch wrench to disconnect the sample loop from the pressure transducer and the needle drive mechanism, as shown in Figure 2-13.
- 2. Connect one end of the sample loop to the needle drive mechanism.
- 3. Connect the open end of the new sample loop to the pressure transducer.
- 4. Use the wrenches to tighten the connections.
- 5. Connect the power cable and power on the Separations Module.
- 6. Enter the new sample loop volume in the Configuration screen (<u>Section 3.2,</u> <u>Configuring the Separations Module</u>).
- Perform a purge and compression check to eliminate air bubbles and check for leaks. Refer to <u>Section 3.4.1, Purging the Sample Management System</u>, for the purge procedure.

#### **Reinstalling the Right Side Panel**

To reinstall the right side panel:

- 1. Mount the side panel on the posts on the rear panel.
- 2. Slide the side panel forward. Be sure the red outlet tube is aligned with the slot in the side panel.
- 3. Install the screws on the side panel.
- 4. If you removed an optional column heater, reconnect the column heater cable and reattach the column heater to the keyed ports.

# 2.8.2 Installing the Column Heater

The column heater is mounted on the right side panel with three screws. A connector on the rear panel of the Separations Module provides power and signal connections to the column heater.



Attention: To avoid possible damage to components, power off the Separations Module before you connect or disconnect the column heater cable.

To install the column heater:

- 1. Power off the Separations Module.
- 2. Install the three screws and retaining washers (from the Startup Kit) on the right side panel.
- 3. Route the red outlet tubing through the slot located halfway up the front chassis of the Separations Module (Figure 2-7).
- 4. Mount the column heater on the three screws on the right side panel.
- Install one end of the cable on the rear of the column heater. Install the other end of the cable on the connector on the rear panel of the Separations Module (Figure 2-3).

# 2.8.3 Installing a Syringe

Refer to <u>Section 7.3.3, Replacing the Syringe</u>, for the procedure to install a syringe.

# Chapter 3 Preparing the 2695 Separations Module for Operation

This chapter describes how to prepare and set up the Waters 2695 Separations Module for operation.

#### **Powering On**

Power on the 2695 Separations Module by moving the power switch (located at the top of the left side panel) to the (ON) I position. The start-up diagnostics routine begins.

#### **Startup Diagnostics**

The startup diagnostics routine performs the following functions and tests:

- CPU board
- Memory (RAM and ROM)
- Keypad
- Display
- External communication
- Digital signal processor (DSP)
- · Floppy disk drive

Once the electronic part of the diagnostics test is complete, the front-panel screen displays the results of the tests, as shown in <u>Figure 3-1</u>.

#### **The Main Screen**

When the initial part of the startup diagnostics routine is successful, the Main screen appears in the front panel display (Figure 3-2). The startup diagnostics routine continues by initializing the:

- · Needle, syringe, and valves
- Carousel carrier
- Solvent management system

The statuses of these mechanical diagnostics tests appear in the banner area of the Main screen (Figure 3-2) while the diagnostics are running. If the startup diagnostics routine is not successful, refer to <u>Section 8.5</u>, <u>Troubleshooting</u>. When the startup diagnostics routine is complete, the Separations Module enters the Idle mode.

# 3.1 Operating Overview

Whether you operate the Separations Module under stand-alone or remote control, you use the Main screen to set up the Separations Module for operation.

# 3.1.1 Screen Display Overview

The Main screen (and all other screens) contain the following three areas (see Figure 3-2 as an example):

- Banner
- Data
- Screen keys

#### **Banner Area**

The banner area of the screen is always displayed, and indicates the current status of the Separations Module. The banner area contains the following information:

- Name of the current screen
- **Current function status** The current state of solvent flow, such as idle, purging, sample, or equilibration
- Work status The number of preprogrammed events that remain to be completed for the current sample set. For example, the status may read: Vial 6/Inj 5/6.
- Remote control Indicates Millennium Chromatography Manager or other remote control modes
- · Current separation method, sample set, or template

#### Data Area

This area of the screen shows specific operating information about the instrument. There are two modes of display:

- **Menu** Shows all control features that allow you to perform certain tasks, such as configuring the Separations Module, or creating or editing separation methods, sample sets, or sample templates
- **Status/Control** Shows detailed status and interactive control information, such as flow rate, sparge (or degassing) rate, and solvent composition

Press the **Menu/Status** key to switch between the two display modes.

#### **Screen Key Area**

This area of the screen shows the current function of the six keys located directly below the display. The screen keys are described in more detail in <u>Section 3.1.2</u>, <u>Using the Keypad</u>. <u>Table 3-1</u> describes the functions of the screen keys for the Main screen only. Each screen key displays a different screen, as described in <u>Table 3-1</u>.

#### **Entering Values in Parameter Fields**

To enter parameter values:

- 1. Use the screen keys or the Menu/Status key to display the appropriate screen.
- 2. Use the arrow keys to select the parameter field you want to change.
- 3. When a diamond is displayed after the field name:

a. Press Enter to display a drop-down list.

b. Use the arrow keys to select the value you want, then press Enter.

- 4. When you need to enter data into a field:
  - Use the numeric keys to enter a numeric value, then press Enter.
  - Use the screen keys to enter alphabetic data, then press Enter. See the <u>"Entering an Alphanumeric String"</u> discussion below.
- 5. To select or deselect a check box:
  - a. Use the arrow keys to select the check box.
  - b. Press any numeric key to place an "X" in the box and activate the option.
  - c. Press any numeric key to clear the box and deactivate the option.

#### **Entering an Alphanumeric String**

When you select a field that requires an alphabetic entry, such as the user name or method name, each screen key is automatically labeled with a group of letters, as shown in <u>Figure 3-3</u>. Press the <u>More</u> key for additional selections, such as uppercase and lowercase letters, and for selected non-alphabetic characters. Press the appropriate numeric keys to enter numbers into the field.

You can enter up to 30 characters in an alphanumeric field. To end and save an alphanumeric entry, press Enter.




Figure 3-4 Steps for Entering Alphabetic Data

Figure 3-4 illustrates the procedure for entering alphabetic data in a text field.

#### Example

To enter the name "Dave" in the User: field, use the following screen key sequence:

- 1. Press the ABCDEF screen key.
- 2. Press the D screen key.
- 3. Press the More screen key, then press the Lowercase screen key.
- 4. Press the abcdef screen key.
- 5. Press the a screen key.
- 6. Press the stuvwx screen key.

- 7. Press the v screen key.
- 8. Press the abcdef screen key.
- 9. Press the e screen key.
- 10. Press Enter to store the entry.

# 3.2 Configuring the Separations Module

Before you can operate the Separations Module, you need to configure the Separations Module for stand-alone or remote control and for a variety of operating parameters. Configure the Separations Module using the Configuration screen whenever you want to:

- · Set up the Separations Module for the first time
- · Change the configuration of the Separations Module
- Add, change, or delete a user
- · Reset the clock

Press the **Configure** screen key in the Main screen to display the Configuration screen (Figure 3-5).

# 3.2.1 Setting Configuration Parameters

Set the following parameters as necessary for your configuration:

- Syringe size, Loop size Specify the size of the syringe and sample loop. These values are preset at the factory, and should be changed only if you install a different syringe and/or sample loop.
- Verify vial presence When checked (the default setting), notifies you if a vial at a specified carousel position is not present.
- Verify carousel placement When checked (the default setting), notifies you if a carousel is mounted in the wrong position when an injection is attempted.
- **System** Selects the operating mode and the IEEE-488 interface bus address (when required). See <u>Section 3.2.2, Configuring the Operating Mode</u>.
- Printer Selects the type of printer and the baud (data transfer) rate and flow control.

**Note:** The baud rate is automatically set to 1200 if you set the 746 Integrator as the printer type.

**Note:** If you set the printer selection to "None," you must select "Disable Reporting" in the Report Options dialog box (see "Setting Report Options" later in this section).

- Date format Selects between MDY (for example, Aug 28 00) or DMY (28 Aug 00).
- Pressure units Selects between psi (pounds per square inch), kPascal (kPa), and bar.
- Alarm sound Selects the type of alarm (continuous or single beep).

Press the screen keys in the Configuration screen to access other parameters whose values you can specify. <u>Table 3-3</u> describes the functions of these screen keys.

User Names	Displays a list of stored user names and allows you to add, change, and remove user names.
Detectors	Scans the IEEE-488 bus and displays a list of the Waters detectors attached to the bus, their addresses, and their firmware revision numbers. Active only when the Separations Module is configured as the System Controller and the detectors are powered on.
Options	Displays a list of the hardware options installed in the Separations Module.

#### **Auto Shutdown**

You can set up the Separations Module to shut down automatically after a specified period of inactivity. Inactivity is defined as:

- No keyboard use
- No injections performed
- No changes sent to the Separations Module from a remotely connected Millennium Chromatography Manager workstation, MassLynx computer, or external autosampler
- · An error condition that suspends the operation of the Separations Module

You can leave the Separations Module in the shutdown state indefinitely. The separation method you specify in the Auto Shutdown dialog box defines the initial conditions that are applied after the specified period of inactivity. Use the auto shutdown function:

- When there is a long delay between injections
- To minimize solvent flow after an unattended or long run
- To minimize sparge gas consumption
- To disable the vacuum degasser

- To disable temperature controls
- To turn off detector lamps

To enable the auto shutdown function:

- 1. Press the **Config** screen key in the Main screen, then press the **More** screen key once.
- 2. Press the Auto Shutdown screen key. The Auto-Shutdown dialog box appears, as shown in Figure 3-6.

- 3. Select the separation method to be used while the Separations Module is shut down. Only the *initial* conditions in the method you select are used.
- 4. Enter a time period (in minutes) after which you want the Separations Module to shut down (or press Clear to disable the Auto Shutdown function).
- Press OK. The Separations Module shuts down when there has been no activity for the specified period.
- 6. Press Exit to return to the Main screen.

**Note:** If you want to use Auto Shutdown to turn off the lamp of a 2487 or 486 Detector, program a Lamp Off event and specify a time of INIT in the I/O Events Timed Table screen (see <u>Section 6.2.5, Setting I/O Parameter Values</u>).

#### **Events In**

To define the signal conditions that enable Stop Flow and Inject Hold on the I/O connector:

1. Press the Events In screen key to display the Events In dialog box (Figure 3-7).

- Press Enter to display the conditions under which a signal on the Stop Flow terminals (on the I/O connector) immediately stops the flow of solvent. You can select from:
  - Ignore Disables the Stop Flow terminals
  - **On High** Stops flow when the signal is high
  - **On Low** Stops flow when the signal is low
- 3. Select the appropriate condition, then press Enter. When the condition is met, the current function is suspended. A dialog box appears, allowing you to abort or resume the function.
- 4. Select the Hold 1 field, then press Enter to display the conditions under which the Hold 1 input stops the next injection.
- 5. Select the appropriate condition, then press Enter.
- Select the Logic field, then press Enter to display the combination of Hold 1 and Hold 2 signals that prevents sample from being drawn into the sample loop. You can select from:
  - And The injection is delayed while the conditions specified on both Hold 1 and Hold 2 are in effect
  - Or The injection is delayed while the conditions specified on either Hold 1 or Hold 2 are in effect

Sample is drawn into the sample loop when the specified conditions are no longer in effect.

7. Select the appropriate logic, then press Enter.

- 8. Repeat step 4 for the Hold 2 field, then press Enter.
- 9. Press the OK screen key to exit the Events In dialog box.

#### **Setting Report Options**

Use the Report Options dialog box to define the information that is sent to the printer, integrator, and/or floppy diskette. (Before you print a report, select the printer in the Printer section of the Configuration screen. You select the destination of the report in the print dialog box that appears when you press the Print screen key.)

To define the information sent to a printer, integrator, and/or floppy disk:

1. Press the Reports screen key to display the Report Options dialog box (Figure 3-8).

2. Select the destination for the report in the drop-down list.

**Note:** If you previously set the printer selection to "None," you must select "Disable Reporting" in this drop-down list.

- Select any option and press any numeric key to enable or disable the option, then press Enter. An "X" in the check box indicates the option is enabled. The options include:
  - Gradient table Generates the gradient table described in <u>Table 6-4</u>
  - I/O event table Generates the I/O table described in Table 6-8
  - Detector table Generates the detector table described in <u>Table 6-15</u>
  - Event overview Generates an overview of all merged tables
  - Misc. parameters Generates a list of all parameters not included in tables

- System config Generates a list of the instrument configuration parameters
- **Per-inject data** Generates a list of the minimum, maximum, and average values for temperature and pressure, the time and date of each injection, the bar code number, and so on
- Alarms Generates a list of the error conditions that occurred during each injection
- 4. Press the **OK** screen key to exit the Report Options dialog box.
- 5. Press Exit to return to the Main screen.

Figure 3-9 is an example of a report with all options enabled.

#### **Compression Check Parameters**

The 2695 Separations Module provides a compression check to test for leaks in the:

- Sample loop
- Seal pack
- Valves (V1, V2, and V3)

You enter the parameters that determine whether the Separations Module passes or fails a compression check in the Compression Check dialog box.

To set the compression check parameters:

- 1. Press the More screen key in the Configuration screen.
- Press the Comp Check screen key. The Compression Check dialog box appears. <u>Figure 3-10</u> shows default parameter settings.

# 3.2.2 Configuring the Operating Mode

Use the **System** field in the Configuration screen (Figure 3-5) to select one of eight operating modes. When you select the System field and press Enter, the list of operating modes is displayed (Figure 3-11).

- No Interaction Use for stand-alone operation.
- System Controller Use for stand-alone operation when controlling Waters detectors over the IEEE-488 interface.
- **Controlled by Millennium**<sup>32</sup> Use when Millennium<sup>32</sup> Chromatography Manager, Version 3.2 or higher, controls the HPLC system.
- Controlled by MassLynx Use to control the Separations Module by Micromass MassLynx software (Version 3.5 or higher) over the IEEE-488 cable interface.
- **Controlled by Millennium 2.xx** Use when the Millennium Chromatography Manager, Version 2.xx, controls the HPLC system.
- Operate Gradient by Event In Use when an autosampler (external to the Separations Module) initiates a chromatographic run by contact closure.
- Controlled via RS232 (ASCII) Use when a non-Waters or non-Micromass data system controls the Separations Module by RS-232 communications, using ASCII protocol, as specified by the data system.
- Controlled via RS232 (binary) Use when a non-Waters or non-Micromass data system controls the Separations Module by RS-232 communications, using binary protocol, as specified by the data system.

#### **No Interaction Mode**

In this stand-alone mode, the Separations Module is not connected to the IEEE-488 interface bus. The Separations Module controls other non-IEEE devices in the HPLC system using the I/O connections on the rear panel. Refer to <u>Section 2.7.1, I/O Signal</u> <u>Connections</u>, for the procedure to make I/O connections. Use this mode if you want to suspend communications with a connected Millennium Chromatography Manager workstation and operate the Separations Module and the other HPLC system components from their front panels.

To set the Separations Module to the No Interaction mode:

- Select the System field in the Configuration screen, then press Enter to display a list of operating modes.
- 2. Select No Interaction, then press Enter.
- 3. Press Exit.

#### System Controller Mode

In this stand-alone mode, the Separations Module controls up to three detector channels on the IEEE-488 bus. This can include two UV detector channels (Waters 2487 and/or 486 Tunable Absorbance Detectors) and one RI detector channel (Waters 2410 or 410 Differential Refractometer). Refer to <u>Section 2.7.2</u>, <u>Digital Signal Connections</u>, for information on IEEE-488 connections. You can also control other HPLC modules using the I/O connections. Refer to <u>Section 2.7.1</u>, <u>I/O Signal Connections</u>, for the information on I/O connections.

To set the Separations Module to the System Controller mode:

- 1. Select the **System** field in the Configuration screen, then press **Enter** to display the list of operating modes.
- 2. Select System Controller, then press Enter.
- Press the Detectors screen key. A list of active devices (with their IEEE-488 interface bus addresses) appears.
  - a. Press the Scan screen key to update the list.
  - b. Press the OK screen key to return to the Configuration screen.
- 4. Press Exit. The Separations Module is ready to control Waters detectors using separation methods and sample sets.

#### Controlled by Millennium<sup>32</sup> Mode

In this remote-control mode, a Millennium Chromatography Manager workstation running Millennium<sup>32</sup> software controls the operation of your HPLC system using the IEEE-488 interface bus. Connect the IEEE-488 cable as described in <u>Section 2.7.2, Digital Signal</u> <u>Connections</u>.

To set the Separations Module to the Controlled by Millennium<sup>32</sup> mode:

- 1. Select the **System** field in the Configuration screen, then press **Enter** to display a list of operating modes.
- Select Controlled by Millennium<sup>32</sup>, then press Enter. The IEEE-488 Address field is highlighted. Note that the 2695 Separations Module requires only one IEEE-488 address when controlled by Millennium<sup>32</sup>.
- 3. Press Enter to display a list of addresses.
- 4. Select an address that is unused by other chromatographic components connected to the Millennium Chromatography Manager workstation, then press Enter.
- 5. Press Exit. The Separations Module is ready to be controlled from the Millennium Chromatography Manager workstation.

Refer to <u>Section 5.2</u>, <u>Making Automatic Runs Under Millennium Control</u>, for details on making runs under Millennium control.</u>

#### Controlled by MassLynx Mode

In this remote-control mode, Micromass MassLynx software (Version 3.5 or higher) controls the 2695 Separations Module (in 2690-emulation mode). MassLynx software is used with Micromass mass spectrometry (MS) detectors, using the IEEE-488 interface between the Micromass computer and the 2695 Separations Module.

To set the Separations Module to the Controlled by MassLynx mode:

- 1. Select the **System** field in the Configuration screen, then press **Enter** to display a list of operating modes.
- 2. Select **Controlled by MassLynx**, then press **Enter**. The IEEE 488 Address field is highlighted.
- 3. Press Enter to display a list of addresses.
- 4. Select an address that is unused by other chromatographic components connected to the Micromass computer, then press Enter.
- 5. Press Exit. The Separations Module is ready to be controlled from the MassLynx computer.

Refer to <u>Section 5.3</u>, <u>Making Automatic Runs Under Micromass MassLynx Control</u>, for details on making runs under MassLynx control.

#### Controlled by Millennium 2.xx Mode

In this remote-control mode, a Millennium Chromatography Manager workstation running Millennium 2.xx software controls the 2695 Separations Module (in 2690- emulation mode) using the IEEE-488 interface bus. Connect the IEEE-488 cable as described in <u>Section 2.7.2, Digital Signal Connections</u>.

To set the Separations Module to the Controlled by Millennium 2.xx mode:

- 1. Select the **System** field in the Configuration screen, then press **Enter** to display a list of operating modes.
- Select Controlled by Millennium 2.xx, then press Enter. The IEEE-488 Address field is highlighted.
- 3. Press Enter to display a list of address pairs.
- 4. Select an address pair that is unused by other chromatographic components connected to the Millennium Chromatography Manager, then press Enter.
- 5. Press Exit. The Separations Module is ready to be controlled from the Millennium Chromatography Manager workstation.

The 2690 Separations Module appears as two devices in the Millennium System view:

- The solvent and sample management systems With an even address
- The optional sample heater/cooler With an odd address

Refer to <u>Section 5.2</u>, <u>Making Automatic Runs Under Millennium Control</u>, for details on making runs under Millennium control.</u>

#### **Controlled by Operate Gradient by Event In Mode**

In this mode, an external autosampler (a Waters 2700 Sample Manager, for example) initiates the start of the chromatographic run and performs the inject function (instead of the Separations Module). In this mode, the Separations Module has no control of IEEE-488 devices, but *can* control non-IEEE devices using the I/O connections on the rear panel. Refer to Section 2.7.1, I/O Signal Connections, for information on I/O connections.

To set the Separations Module to the Operate Gradient by Event In mode:

- 1. Select the **System** field in the Configuration screen, then press **Enter** to display a list of operating modes.
- 2. Select Operate Gradient by Event In, then press Enter.
- Press the Events In screen key to display the Events In dialog box (<u>Figure 3-7</u>). For information on defining Events In conditions, refer to <u>Section 3.2.1, Setting</u> <u>Configuration Parameters</u>, the "Events In" discussion.
- Set the Stop Flow field to the appropriate condition (Ignore, High, or Low), then press Enter.
  - Choose Ignore if the Stop Flow I/O terminals of the Separations Module are not used.
  - Choose High if the output connection from the external autosampler to the Stop Flow I/O terminals of the Separations Module changes to a high (more positive) TTL-level.

- Choose Low if the output connection from the external autosampler to the Stop Flow I/O terminals of the Separations Module changes to a low (more negative) TTL-level.
- 5. Set the Hold 1 field to the appropriate condition (High or Low), then press Enter.
  - Choose High if the output connection from the external autosampler to the Hold 1 Inject terminals of the Separations Module changes to a high (more positive) TTL-level to initiate a chromatographic run (and prevent an injection by the Separations Module).
  - Choose Low if the output connection from the external autosampler to the Hold 1 Inject terminals of the Separations Module changes to a low (more negative) TTL-level to initiate a chromatographic run (and prevent an injection by the Separations Module).

*Note:* If you are configuring the Separations Module with a Waters 2700 Sample Manager, select Low.

- 6. Set the Logic field to Or, then press Enter.
- 7. Set the Hold 2 field to Ignore, then press Enter.
- Press the OK screen key to save your selections and exit from the Events In dialog box.

#### Controlled via RS-232 (ASCII) or (Binary) Mode

In these remote-control modes, a non-Waters or non-Micromass data system (a mass spectrometry system, for example) controls the Separations Module using RS-232 ASCII or binary communications. The Separations Module disconnects from the IEEE-488 interface bus when either of these modes is selected. The Separations Module can control other non-IEEE devices in the HPLC system using the I/O connections on the rear panel. Refer to <u>Section 2.7.1, I/O Signal Connections</u>, for information on I/O connections.

To set the Separations Module to the Controlled via RS-232 (ASCII) or (Binary) mode:

- 1. Select the **System** field in the Configuration screen, then press **Enter** to display a list of operating modes.
- Select Controlled via RS232 (ASCII) or Controlled via RS232 (Binary), then press Enter.
- 3. Press Exit. The Separations Module is ready to be controlled by a remote data system using RS-232 communications.

**Note:** If you experience repeated problems when using a third-party data system, reconfigure the Separations Module to No Interaction mode. If the problem persists, refer to the appropriate section of this guide. If the problem occurs when using a third-party data system, but not when the instrument is configured in No Interaction mode, contact the data system vendor.

# 3.3 Preparing the Solvent Management System

The Separations Module is designed to provide a pulse-free, accurate, and precise flow of solvent. For optimal performance, you need to:

- · Properly prepare the solvent reservoirs
- Use degassed (or sparged) solvents
- · Prime the solvent management system
- · Prime the plunger seal-wash pump




Figure 3-12 Preparing the Solvent Management System for Operation

Figure 3-12 shows the steps in preparing the solvent management system for operation.

**Note:** To maintain the efficiency of the solvent management system, and to obtain accurate, reproducible chromatograms, use only chromatography-grade solvents.

**Caution:** Observe safe laboratory practices when you handle solvents. Refer to the Material Safety Data Sheets for the solvents you use.

# 3.3.1 Preparing Solvent Reservoirs

Choose solvent reservoirs that provide a snug fit for the reservoir caps supplied in the Startup Kit. Waters recommends 1-L reservoirs. Place the reservoirs in the solvent bottle tray and position the tray *above* the solvent management system components.

The solvent reservoir caps help maintain a continuously sparged environment in the reservoirs (for units equipped with helium sparge) and controls solvent evaporation. Each cap has three feather-edged holes to produce a positive seal around the solvent, sparge, and vent tubes.

Install the solvent, sparge, and vent lines as described in <u>Section 2.6, Making Fluidic</u> <u>Connections</u>.

### 3.3.2 Degassing Solvents

#### Sparging

For systems outfitted with the Sparge option, helium sparging reduces the total dissolved oxygen and nitrogen in the solvent reservoirs and maintains that condition during operation. Use an ultra-pure carrier (UPC) grade of helium to prevent solvent contamination. Refer to <u>Section C.7, Mobile Phase Solvent Degassing</u>, for more information on sparging.

Be sure the reservoirs and sparge tubing are set up according to the procedures in <u>Section 2.6.3, Making Sparge Gas Connections</u>.

Set the sparge rates in the Programmed Sparge screen described in <u>Section 4.4.4,</u> <u>Programming the Sparge Cycles</u>.

#### **Inline Vacuum Degassing**

Inline vacuum degassing reduces the total dissolved gas in the mobile phase. For more information on vacuum degassing, refer to <u>Section 1.5</u>, the "Degasser Considerations" discussion.

**Note:** For proper operation of the inline vacuum degasser, you must fill each vacuum chamber with solvent. Use the dry prime direct function to prime all solvent lines.

To control the inline vacuum degasser from the Status screen:

1. Press Menu/Status. The Status screen is displayed (Figure 3-13).

- Press the Next Page screen key (if necessary) to display the degasser fields (Figure 3-13).
- Select the Degasser mode field, then press Enter to display a list of degasser modes. The modes are:
  - **On** The degasser is always on
  - Off The degasser is always off
- 4. Select the desired operating mode, then press Enter.

The Vac pump field displays the current status of the vacuum degasser pump.

The Pressure field displays the current vacuum level in psia, bar, or kPa.

# 3.3.3 Priming the Plunger Seal-Wash Pump

The seal-wash solvent lubricates each plunger and flushes away any solvent or dried salts forced past the plunger seal from the high-pressure side of the piston chamber. This wash cycle extends the life of the seals. Position the plunger seal-wash reservoir in a visible location above the solvent management system, and refill the reservoir as necessary.



Attention: Use separate solutions and containers for the plunger-seal wash and needle wash. Because the functions of these solutions differ, the use of one solution for both functions may compromise the effectiveness of either needle washing or plunger-seal washing.

For reversed-phase HPLC applications, use an aqueous plunger seal-wash solution with enough organic content to inhibit bacterial growth. For example, use an 80% water:20%

methanol solution or an 80% water:20% acetonitrile solution, depending on your application. For all GPC separations, use a 50% methanol:50% water seal-wash solution. If required, use an intermediate solution to prevent immiscibility or precipitation problems when you switch between GPC and reversed-phase analytical solvents.

To prime the plunger seal-wash pump for first-time use or when the entire line is dry:

**Note:** If you are adding the same plunger seal wash-solution or changing to a solution that is totally miscible with the existing solution, perform only steps 1,5,6, and 8.

 Press the Diag screen key in the Main screen. The Diagnostics screen appears (Figure 3-14). Refer to Section 8.3, Performing Main Diagnostics, for more information on the Diagnostics screen.

- 2. Attach the syringe adapter to the syringe (both are found in the Startup Kit).
- 3. Remove the inlet filter from the seal-wash inlet tube.
- 4. Fill the syringe with the seal-wash solution, then attach the syringe adapter to the end of the seal-wash inlet tube.
- Press the Prime Seal-Wash screen key, then press the Start screen key. The seal-wash procedure begins. Push on the syringe plunger to force seal-wash solvent through the system.
- 6. When seal-wash solvent flows out of the seal-wash waste tube, press the Halt screen key.
- 7. Reinstall the inlet filter and place the seal-wash inlet tube in the seal-wash reservoir.
- 8. Press Close to return to the Diagnostics screen.

# 3.3.4 Priming the Solvent Management System

Prime the solvent management system using the:


- · Dry prime option when the solvent lines are dry
- · Wet prime option when you want to change between miscible solvents


Use the procedure in <u>Section 4.4.1, Performing a Dry Prime</u>, or <u>Section 4.4.2, Performing</u> <u>a Wet Prime</u>, as appropriate.

Once you have prepared the solvent management system for operation, you need to prepare the sample management system for operation.

# 3.4 Preparing the Sample Management System

Prepare the sample management system for operation after you have prepared the solvent management system (<u>Section 3.3, Preparing the Solvent Management System</u>). <u>Figure 3-15</u> shows the steps in preparing the sample management system for operation.





# 3.4.1 Purging the Sample Management System

Purge the sample management system whenever you:

- · Prime the solvent management system
- Change solvents

- See bubbles in the syringe
- · Start using the Separations Module at the beginning of each day



**Attention:** To avoid precipitating salts in the Separations Module, use an intermediate solvent such as water when you change from buffers to high-organic-content solvents.

To purge the sample management system:

- 1. In the Main screen, press Menu/Status to display the Status screen.
- 2. Enter the appropriate solvent composition in the Composition fields.
- 3. Press **Direct Functions** to display the Direct Functions menu.
- 4. Select Purge Injector, then press Enter. The Purge Injector dialog box appears.
- 5. Enter the number of sample loop volumes in the Sample Loop Volumes field (use the default value of 6.0 volumes), then press Enter. The solvent management system ramps up to a predetermined flow rate to flush the sample loop with the selected volume.
- 6. Leave the Compression Check check box blank the first time you start up the system to prevent a compression test from occurring. The Separations Module does not allow a compression test before the seal pack is adjusted.
- 7. Press OK. The purge cycle begins.

### 3.4.2 Priming the Needle-Wash Pump

The needle-wash pump flushes the needle in the sample management system, preventing carryover of sample between injections. The needle-wash also extends the life of the injector seals by removing buffered mobile phase and sample from the needle.

#### Selecting a Needle-Wash Solvent

Use a needle-wash solvent based on the sample and mobile phase chemistries, making sure all solutions/buffers are miscible and soluble.

A gradient separation typically involves the initial use of a weak solvent combination, whereas final conditions usually have a combination of stronger solvents. In general, it is best to choose a needle-wash solvent similar to final gradient conditions. For example, in a separation with an initial gradient of 80% water:20% methanol and a final gradient of 10% water:90% methanol, an effective needle-wash solvent would be 20% water:80% methanol.

The choice of a needle-wash solvent similar, but not equivalent, to final gradient composition ensures solubility of early eluting peaks. When sample solubility in the mobile phase is pH-dependent, choose a needle-wash solution that is similarly pH- adjusted. If

acids are used, avoid long-term exposure of the needle-wash system to halide-containing acids.

Using samples containing strongly hydropholic components may require experimentation to determine the best needle-wash solvent. In these cases, the use of a needle-wash solvent such as 20% water:80% methanol with tetrahydrofuran (THF) or dimethylsulfoxide (DMSO) [1-5 mL THF or DMSO/99-95 mL needle-wash solvent] may be superior.

<u>Table 3-5</u> lists some needle-wash solvents recommended for use with certain mobile phase conditions. High sample concentrations may require other needle-wash solvents.



**Attention:** Use separate solutions and containers for needle wash and plunger seal wash. Because the functions of these solutions differ, the use of one solution for both functions may compromise the effectiveness of either needle washing or plunger seal washing.

 a. If the aqueous portion of the analytical solution is pH-adjusted to ensure sample solubility, match the pH of the aqueous portion of the needle-wash solution to it. If acids are used, avoid long-term exposure of the needle-wash system to halide-containing acids.

To prime the needle-wash pump:

- 1. Be sure the needle-wash fluidic lines are properly installed, as described in <u>Section 2.6.6</u>, Installing Needle Wash and Plunger Seal Wash Reservoirs.
- Press the Diag screen key in the Main screen. The Diagnostics screen appears (Figure 3-14).
- Press the Prime NdlWash screen key. The 30-second needle-wash procedure begins. If solvent does not flow out of the waste tube within 30 seconds, press the Start Again screen key.

# 3.4.3 Adjusting the Seal Pack

Adjust the seal pack whenever:

- You start up the Separations Module for the first time. The Separations Module does not perform injections or compression checks until the seal pack has been adjusted.
- A "Compression Check Failed" error appears in the screen.
- A "Missing Restrictor" alarm appears during a diagnostic procedure.
- You change the seal pack.
- You rebuild the seal pack.

Before you adjust the seal pack, purge the sample management system to ensure that there is no air in the syringe. Air in the system may cause Alarm Seal Geometry or Alarm Missing Restrictor dialog boxes to (erroneously) appear.

To adjust the seal pack:

- 1. Press the Diag screen key in the Main screen to display the Diagnostics screen.
- 2. Press the Adjust Seals screen key. The adjustment procedure begins. When the test is complete, the results are shown in the dialog box that appears.

Section 8.3.4, Adjusting the Seals, provides additional information about adjusting the seal pack.

# 3.4.4 Loading Carousels

To load the carousels:




Figure 3-16 Door is Open Dialog Box

- 1. Open the carousel door. The Door is Open dialog box appears in the screen, as shown in Figure 3-16.
- 2. Press the Next screen key (or select the desired carousel screen key) to position the carousel turntable for loading the appropriate carousel.

- 3. Load the carousel into the sample compartment.
- 4. Repeat steps 2 and 3 until all appropriate carousels are loaded.
- Close the carousel door. If you enable the "Verify carousel placement" check box (the default setting) in the Configuration screen (<u>Figure 3-5</u>), an error message appears if you attempt to make an injection from a carousel that is in the wrong position.

# 3.5 Recommended Procedures for Preparing for Operation

This section outlines the steps to prepare both degasser and sparge-based 2695 Separations Modules for operation using Waters-recommended procedures. Flowcharts provide the sequence of steps to prime, equilibrate, and purge a Separations Module that is in one of the following states:

- A new or dry Separations Module
- A Separations Module that has been turned off or left idle with no flow
- A Separations Module that requires a solvent change (from a buffered solvent to an organic solvent)

For step-by-step instructions on how to use Direct Functions to prime, equilibrate, and purge your Separations Module, refer to <u>Section 4.4, Performing Direct Functions</u>.






Figure 3-17 Preparing a New or Dry Separations Module for Operation (Sparge-Based Unit)

Figure 3-17 outlines how to prime, equilibrate, and purge a sparge-based Separations Module that is new or dry.


Figure 3-18 Preparing a New or Dry Separations Module for Operation (PerformancePLUS Degasser-Based Unit) <u>Figure 3-19</u> outlines how to prime, equilibrate, and purge a sparge-based Separations Module that has been powered off or is idle with no solvent flow.


Figure 3-19 Preparing an Idle or Powered-Off Separations Module for Operation (Sparge-Based Unit)



# 3.5.1 AutoStartPLUS Startup Procedure

AutoStartPLUS is a new startup procedure introduced with version 2.00 firmware for 2695 Separations Modules.

To standardize your daily system startup routine, Waters developed a unique sample set and methods (protocols) to assist in preparing your 2695 Separations Modules for chromatography. A sample set with unique separation methods called AutoStartPLUS was created to purge and equilibrate the system automatically. The 2695 Separations Module has been factory-programmed with the AutoStartPLUS protocols. You can copy and save AutoStartPLUS under a different sample file name, and then edit it to suit your specific needs.

AutoStartPLUS uses a four-button process (refer to <u>"Accessing AutoStartPLUS"</u>) and is designed to assist and perform the startup procedures in <u>Figure 3-20</u>. The process uses:




Figure 3-24 Methods Screen with AutoStartPLUS Selected

### Accessing AutoStartPLUS

To access and start AutoStartPLUS from the Waters 2695 Separations Module Main screen:

- 1. Press Run Samples to open the Methods screen.
- 2. Select the sample set labeled AutoStartPLUS.
- 3. Press Run.
- 4. Press Start.
- 5. Press Stat to begin the AutoStartPLUS run immediately or Routine to start the AutoStartPLUS run after the completion of the current work.

#### **AutoStartPLUS Requirements**

AutoStartPLUS was created assuming an A:B gradient and a 3.9 x 250 mm column are used (see Figure 3-20). If your conditions differ from these, see <u>"Creating a Customized</u> <u>Start Method"</u>.

- The 2695 Separations Module must:
  - Display "Idle" status in the banner area of the Main screen. This means that all front-panel controls are accessible and fully functional.
  - Have been left off or idle with no solvent flow for less than one week.
- Have the plunger-seal wash and needle-wash pumps primed and operational.
- Have the analytical solvents, plunger-seal wash, and needle-wash solutions present in sufficient quantities, or have been freshly prepared.


**Note:** Do not use aqueous-based solutions if it is possible that bacterial growth or contamination has occurred. Replace these with freshly prepared solutions.

- Use a binary gradient of Solvents A and B.
- Use a 3.9 x 250 mm column. Column equilibration is based on these column dimensions.

#### Setting Up the Separations Module for Operation

The AutoStartPLUS procedure follows the steps in <u>Figure 3-20</u>. It is intended for use with 2695 Separations Modules with the PerformancePLUS Inline Degasser.

<u>Figure 3-25</u> shows the relationship of the AutoStartPLUS program to the step-by-step preparation of operation for the most commonly used startup routine (<u>Figure 3-20</u>). This flowchart reviews how to prime, equilibrate, and purge a PerformancePLUS vacuum degasser-based Separations Module that has been powered off or is idle with no solvent flow.

The AutoStartPLUS separation methods were created by pressing the **New** key in the Develop Methods screen and making simple modifications. Refer to <u>Section 6.1, Creating</u> and Editing Separation Methods. To create a customized start method:

1. Lock the sample set to prevent modification, if you desire.

**Note:** When you lock a method, write down the password and store it safely for reference because locked methods cannot be deleted.

- 2. If you want to create a similar procedure from a locked AutoStartPLUS procedure to suit your needs, you can either:
  - Copy the sample set and the appropriate separation methods, rename and then edit them to change parameters as needed.
  - Create new methods from the default method and create a sample set that links to your separation methods.

#### AutoStartPLUS Operation

The following automated steps occur:

- 1. The sample set AutoStartPLUS starts.
- 2. The first separation method, Auto APLUS, does the following:
  - a. Sets the degasser to On
  - b. Starts a wet prime at 7.5 mL/min. for 0.2 min. (12 seconds) to fully wet each chamber's gas exchange tubing
- 3. The separation methods Auto BPLUS, Auto CPLUS, and Auto DPLUS execute sequentially and the:
  - a. Degasser stays set at On
  - b. Solvent choice changes
- 4. After the separation method Auto DPLUS finishes, the separation method Auto Eq DegasPLUS:
  - a. Keeps the degasser set to On
  - b. Turns off solvent flow to remove any dissolved gas from each solvent line, since the solvent is sitting statically in each chamber.
- After separation method Auto Eq DegasPLUS finishes, the separation method Auto A:B GradPLUS:
  - a. Keeps the degasser set to On
  - b. Wet primes the solvent (A and B in this example), filling the flow path with a 50% mixture at a flow rate that allows high efficiency degassing

- 6. After separation method Auto A:B GradPLUS finishes, the separation method Auto Eq ColumnPLUS:
  - a. Allows the degasser to stay set to On
  - b. Begins flushing the column with ~300 uL of 50:50 A:B (residual in flow path)
  - c. Continues with the assumed, initial gradient condition of 100% A for 30 minutes at 1 mL/min (based on the use of a 3.9-mm x 250-mm column [~10 column volumes])
- 7. After separation method Auto Eq ColumnPLUS finishes, the separation method Auto Purge LoopPLUS:
  - a. Continues to keep the degasser set to On
  - b. Purges the sample management system with 10 loop volumes of initial gradient solvent, here assumed to be 100% A
  - c. Performs a compression test of the sample management system
  - d. Sets the flow to 0.00 mL/min of 100% A

Auto Purge LoopPLUS is programmed to perform a compressibility check using the default values.

# 3.6 Powering Off the Separations Module

### **Before Powering Off**

Before you power off the 2695 Separations Module, you need to remove any buffered mobile phase present in the fluidic path.



Attention: To avoid damaging your column, remove the column before you perform the STOP following procedure.

To remove buffered mobile phase from the fluidic path of the Separations Module:

- 1. Replace the buffered mobile phase with HPLC-quality water and wet prime the system for 10 minutes at 3 mL/min (see <u>Section 4.4.2, Performing a Wet Prime</u>).
- 2. Perform three injector purge cycles to ensure that the sample loop is clean (see <u>Section 4.4.2</u>, <u>"Purging the Injector"</u> discussion.
- 3. Replace the plunger seal-wash solvent with a fresh solution of 80% water:20% methanol or a miscible solvent, and prime the plunger seal-wash pump (see <u>Section 3.3.3, Priming the Plunger Seal-Wash Pump</u>).
- 4. Replace the water mobile phase with a solution of 90% methanol:10% water, and flush the system for 10 minutes at 3 mL/min.
- 5. Replace the needle-wash solvent with a solution of 90% methanol:10% water or a miscible solvent, and perform a needle-wash prime (see <u>Section 3.4.2, Priming the</u> <u>Needle-Wash Pump</u>).

### **Powering Off**

To power off the Separations Module:

- 1. Ensure that the system has been flushed properly (see the <u>"Before Powering Off"</u> discussion above).
- 2. Press the power switch to the (Off) **0** position. The time and date of power-off are entered in the log file.

# Chapter 4 Front Panel Control

If your Separations Module is configured in the No Interaction or Operate Gradient by Event In mode, you control each HPLC system component individually from its front panel. If your Separations Module is configured in the System Controller mode, you control all components in your HPLC system through the front panel of the Separations Module. This chapter describes how to use the front panel of your Separations Module to:

- · Monitor the operation of your HPLC system
- Prepare for making runs
- Initiate runs
- Initiate functions

Refer to <u>Chapter 5, Making Automatic Runs</u>, for information on controlling the Separations Module from the Millennium Chromatography Manager or from other remote data systems.

# 4.1 Routine Startup




Figure 4-1 Main Screen

If the Separations Module is not already powered on, follow the power-on procedure described at the beginning of <u>Chapter 3</u>, <u>Preparing the 2695 Separations Module</u> for <u>Operation</u>. When the startup diagnostics routine is complete, the Separations Module enters the Idle mode (<u>Figure 4-1</u>).

To automatically identify the reports and methods you will generate, press Enter, then select your name in the User list. If your name is not on the list, you can enter it by pressing the Config screen key (to display the Configuration screen), pressing the User Names screen key (to display the Users dialog box), then entering your name using the keypad. If necessary, refer to Section 3.1.2, Using the Keypad, the <u>"Entering an Alphanumeric String"</u> discussion. A user name is not required to operate the Separations Module.

The time and date of power-on are entered into the log file.

# 4.2 Loading Sample Vials

Loading the sample vials involves:

- · Removing the carousel from the sample compartment
- Loading the vials into the carousel
- · Loading the carousel into the sample compartment

### **Removing the Carousel**

To remove a carousel from the sample compartment:




Figure 4-2 Door is Open Dialog Box

1. Open the carousel door. The Door is Open dialog box appears in the screen, as shown in Figure 4-2.

- 2. Press the Next screen key, or select the desired carousel screen key (A to E), to move the desired carousel to the front loading position.
- 3. Remove the carousel from the sample chamber.

### **Loading Vials**

Use only  $12 \times 32$ -mm (2-mL) sample vials. Refer to <u>Appendix B, Spare Parts</u>, for information on ordering vials. Also, refer to <u>Section B.4</u>, <u>Vials and Low Volume Inserts</u>, for details on setting syringe draw depth offsets.

Insert the prepared vials into the appropriate positions in the carousel(s). Be sure to place vials in the numbered slots that correspond to the sample set (if any) you are using. For an overview of the vial positions specified in the sample set, display the vial numbers in the Loading View of the Sample Set table, as described in <u>Section 5.1.2</u>, <u>Viewing Sample</u>. <u>Sets</u>. If you are not using a sample set, enter the vial positions containing the samples in the Inject Samples dialog box, as described in <u>Section 4.4.7</u>, <u>Injecting Samples</u>. If you are using the bar code option, make sure you have correctly attached labels to the vials.

#### Loading the Carousel

To load the carousel:

- 1. Open the carousel door if it is closed. The Door is Open dialog box appears on the screen, as shown in <u>Figure 4-2</u>.
- 2. Press the Next screen key (or select the desired carousel screen key) to position the carousel turntable for loading the appropriate carousel.
- 3. Load the carousel into the sample compartment.
- 4. Close the carousel door. If you load a carousel in the wrong location and the "Verify Carousel Placement" parameter in the Configuration screen is selected, an error message appears when you attempt to make an injection from that carousel.

# 4.3 Monitoring Your HPLC System

You can use the Status screen to monitor the current status of your HPLC system during a run. Press Menu/Status to display the first page of the Status screen (Figure 4-3). The content and layout of the Status screen vary with the options installed in the Separations Module and with the mode of operation.

# 4.4 Performing Direct Functions




Figure 4-6 Steps to Setting Up a Direct Control Run

<u>Figure 4-6</u> outlines the procedure for using the front panel to set up the Separations Module to perform a direct function.

To access the direct control functions:

- 1. Press Menu/Status to display the Status screen (Figure 4-3).




Figure 4-7 Direct Functions Menu

- 2. Press the **Direct Function** screen key. A list of direct functions appears, as shown in Figure 4-7. Table 4-2 describes each of the direct functions.
- 3. Select the function you want to specify, then press Enter. Follow the instructions for each function, as described in the following sections.

**Note:** To run timed events without injecting a sample, select the Inject Samples option from the Direct Functions menu and enter an injection volume of zero (see <u>Section 4.4.7,</u> <u>Injecting Samples</u>).

# 4.4.1 Performing a Dry Prime

Use the dry prime option to prime the system when the fluidic path in the solvent management system is dry. Refer to <u>Section 3.5, Recommended Procedures for</u> Preparing for Operation, Figure 3-17 and Figure 3-18, for more information on dry priming.

To perform a dry prime:

- 1. Set up the reservoirs as described in <u>Section 2.6.3</u>, <u>Making Sparge Gas</u> <u>Connections</u>, or <u>Section 2.6.4</u>, <u>Installing the Degasser Vent Tubing</u>.
- 2. Insert the solvent tubing into the appropriate reservoir(s). Be sure the detector waste line and the sample loop waste line drain into an appropriate container.
- 3. Gently shake the filters in the reservoirs to remove any bubbles that may be trapped.




Figure 4-8 Prime/Vent Valve with Syringe

- 4. Attach an empty syringe to the prime/vent valve, as shown in <u>Figure 4-8</u>, then open the valve by turning it counterclockwise 1/2 turn.

**Note:** The syringe does not lock onto the prime/vent valve; hold it in place while you pull on the plunger.

- 5. Press the **Direct Function** screen key on the Status screen. The Direct Functions menu appears, as shown in Figure 4-7.




Figure 4-9 Dry Prime Dialog Box

- 6. Select **Dry Prime**, then press **Enter**. The Dry Prime dialog box shown in Figure 4-9 appears.

- 7. Press the screen key corresponding to the solvent line you want to prime.
- 8. Withdraw the syringe plunger to pull solvent through the tubing. You may need to exert force to pull the air and solvent through the system. Continue until you pull all the air through the solvent line into the syringe.
- 9. Repeat steps 7 and 8 for each solvent line you want to prime, then close the prime/vent valve.
- 10. Press a screen key corresponding to the solvent line with which you want to prime the system. Waters recommends that you prime using the solvent with the lowest viscosity to help purge air from the lines, especially if the inline vacuum degasser is installed.
- 11. In the Enter a Duration field, enter the length of time (in minutes) to prime the solvent management system. Start with a value of 5 minutes. Press Continue.

The solvent management system begins to operate. At the end of the priming period, the solvent management system turns off and the Separations Module enters the Idle mode.

12. Perform a wet prime, as described next.

## 4.4.2 Performing a Wet Prime

**Attention:** To avoid damaging the plunger seals, perform a wet prime only when there is solvent in the solvent management system fluidic path.

Perform a wet prime when you want to change reservoirs or solvents, or if the Separations Module has been idle for some time. The wet prime replaces solvent in the path from the reservoirs to V3 (waste). If the solvent lines are dry, perform the dry prime procedure before continuing (see <u>Section 4.4.1, Performing a Dry Prime</u>).



Attention: To avoid having salts precipitate in the Separations Module, use an intermediate solvent such as water when you change from buffers to high-organic-content solvents. Refer to <u>Section C.3, Solvent Miscibility</u>, for information on solvent miscibility.

To perform a wet prime:

- In the Status screen Composition field, enter 100% for the solvent you want to use for wet priming. Waters recommends that you start the wet prime using the solvent with the lowest viscosity to help purge air from the lines, especially if the inline vacuum degasser is installed.
- Press the Direct Function screen key in the Status screen. The Direct Functions menu appears, as shown in <u>Figure 4-7</u>.

 Select Wet Prime, then press Enter. The Wet Prime dialog box appears (Figure 4-10).

- 4. Gently shake the filters in the reservoirs to remove any bubbles that may have formed.
- 5. Enter the flow rate and duration to prime (using the composition entered in the Status screen), then press the OK screen key. The solvent management system begins to operate.

At the end of the time period you specify, the solvent management system returns to the previous conditions, and the Separations Module enters the Idle mode.

6. Repeat steps 1 to 5 for each solvent, as appropriate.

#### **Equilibrating Solvents in the Vacuum Degasser**

Solvents are equilibrated in their respective degasser chamber by setting a zero flow rate for a short time period. The steps that follow describe this process. For more information on vacuum degassing, refer to the "Degasser Considerations" discussion in <u>Section 1.5</u>.

To equilibrate solvents in the inline vacuum degasser after you have wet primed the system:

- 1. Enter the initial solvent composition for the run in the Status screen.
- 2. Set the Degasser Mode parameter in the Status screen to ON.
- Press the Direct Function screen key. The Direct Functions menu appears (see Figure 4-7).

- Select Wet Prime, then press Enter. The Wet Prime dialog box appears (Figure 4-10).
- 5. Enter a flow rate of 0.000 mL/min and a time of 5 min. At the end of the time period, the solvents are degassed and the Separations Module enters the Idle mode.

The solvents in the inline vacuum degasser are now equilibrated and the Separations Module is prepared to run. Perform any of the following functions as necessary:

- Purge injector
- Purge the refractometer reference cell
- Condition column
- · Equilibrate the system

#### **Purging the Injector**

Purge the injector to:

- · Remove any traces of solvent from a previous run
- · Clear air bubbles from the fluidic path or the syringe
- Change over to a new (miscible) solvent after you perform a wet prime

The purge process can include a compression check to test the needle seals.



Attention: To avoid having salts precipitate in the Separations Module, use an intermediate solvent such as water when you change from buffers to high-organic-content solvents. Refer to <u>Section C.3, Solvent Miscibility</u>, for information on solvent miscibility.

To purge the injector:

- 1. Press the **Direct Function** screen key in the Status screen. The Direct Functions menu appears (Figure 4-7).
- Select the Purge Injector option, then press Enter. The Purge Injector dialog box appears (<u>Figure 4-11</u>).

3. Enter the number of sample loop volumes with which the injector is to be purged. Start with a value of six sample loop volumes.

To perform a compression test after the purge, move the cursor to the Compression check check box and press any numeric key. You can see the results of the compression check in the Diagnostics screen.

4. Press **OK**. The purge cycle begins.

# 4.4.3 Purging the 2410 and 410 Reference Cell

You can purge the reference and sample sides of the Waters 2410 and 410 Differential Refractometers using the Purge 410 Reference direct function. Purge the fluidic path whenever you change solvents or you experience an unexpected loss in sensitivity due to excess noise or drift.

To purge the 2410 or 410 reference cell:

- 1. In the Status screen, enter the flow rate and composition at which you want to purge the 2410 or 410 reference cell.
- Press the Direct Function screen key. The Direct Functions menu appears (Figure 4-7).
- Select Purge 410 Reference, then press Enter. The Purge 410 Reference dialog box appears (Figure 4-12).

- 4. Enter the amount of time (in minutes) for which you want to pump fresh solvent through the reference cell, then press OK.
- 5. Press the **OK** screen key. The timer starts counting down.

# 4.4.4 Programming the Sparge Cycles

Note: The Sparge screen is disabled when the inline vacuum degasser is enabled.

For systems outfitted with the Sparge option, you set the initial and maintenance sparge cycles from the Sparge screen. Also, you can set different sparge cycles for each of the four solvent reservoirs. Refer to <u>Section 3.5, Recommended Procedures for Preparing for</u> <u>Operation, Figure 3-17</u> and <u>Figure 3-18</u>, for more information on sparging.

To program the sparge cycle:

- Press the Direct Function screen key in the Status screen. The Direct Functions menu appears (Figure 4-7).
- Select the Program Sparge option, then press Enter. The Programmed Sparge dialog box appears (Figure 4-13).

- 3. In the Time field, enter the time to run the initial sparge cycle, then enter values for each solvent reservoir for the following parameters:
  - Initial sparge cycle rates
  - Idle sparge cycle rates

At a sparge cycle rate of 100%, the sparge valve is on at all times; at a sparge cycle rate of less than 100%, the sparge valve turns on and off periodically.

Press the **Disable Sparge** screen key if you do not want to sparge the reservoirs.

Press the **OK** screen key. The timer starts counting down, and the sparge gas flows at the initial sparge cycle rates. The idle sparge cycle rate begins when the timer expires.

## 4.4.5 Equilibrating the System

To equilibrate the HPLC system, the Separations Module delivers solvent through the system at the initial conditions specified in the Status screen or in the separation method specified in the Method field (see <u>Chapter 6</u>, <u>Creating Methods</u>, <u>Sample Sets</u>, <u>and Sample</u> <u>Templates</u>). This flushes the fluidic path of any sample and solvent that were run at other compositions, and prepares the system for the next run.

To equilibrate the system:

- 1. Press Menu/Status to display the Status screen (Figure 4-3).
- Enter the desired initial conditions in the Status screen, or in the Method field, select the separation method that contains the initial conditions at which you want to equilibrate.

- 3. Press the Direct Function screen key.
- Select Equilibrate, then press Enter. The Equilibrate dialog box appears (Figure 4-14).

- 5. Enter the amount of time for which you want to equilibrate the system.
- Press the OK screen key. The Separations Module begins the equilibration procedure. When the equilibration period ends, the Separations Module enters the Idle state. The flow rate remains at the value in the Flow field in the Status screen.

# 4.4.6 Conditioning the Column

Conditioning the column involves running a solvent gradient through the column without injecting samples or running the Events table. You select a separation method (see <u>Chapter 6, Creating Methods, Sample Sets, and Sample Templates</u>) that contains the gradient parameters, and the Separations Module runs the gradient method.

**Note:** To run timed events without injecting a sample, select the Inject Samples option from the Direct Functions menu and enter an injection volume of zero (see <u>Section 4.4.7,</u> <u>Injecting Samples</u>).

To condition the column:

- 1. Press Menu/Status to display the Status screen (Figure 4-3).
- 2. Select the **Method** field, then select the separation method with which you want to condition the column.
- 3. Press the Direct Function screen key.

4. Select **Condition Column**, then press **Enter**. The Condition Column dialog box appears (Figure 4-15).

- 5. Enter the time to condition the column. The time should be equal to or greater than the time for the gradient defined in the selected separation method plus any reequilibration time.
- 6. Press the **OK** screen key. The solvent management system starts the conditioning procedure.

# 4.4.7 Injecting Samples

Using the keypad, you can inject one or more samples from one or more contiguous vials. The Separations Module uses the instrument conditions displayed in the Status screen. You can use gradients and timed events by selecting a separation method in the Method field. The current separation method is displayed in the Banner area.



Attention: If you make any changes to the conditions displayed in the Status screen, the Method field changes to <direct> and the separation method name in the Banner area is enclosed within brackets (< >). The current isocratic conditions (with no timed events) are used for the injection. Choosing a separation method removes the <direct> label from the method field and uses any programmed gradients or timed events.

To inject a sample:

1. Place the prepared sample vial(s) in a carousel. Insert the carousel in the sample compartment, as described in <u>Section 4.2, Loading Sample Vials</u>.

- 2. Close the carousel door. If the door is left open, the Separations Module does not perform the injection.
- 3. Enter the desired initial conditions in the Status screen, or select the Method field, and then select the separation method that contains the conditions under which you want to perform the injection.
- Press the Direct Function screen key in the Status screen. The Direct Functions menu appears (Figure 4-7).
- Select the Inject Samples option, then press Enter. The Inject Samples dialog box appears (Figure 4-16).

- 6. Enter the vial range, which includes the vial positions from which you want to make injections. Use the "." key to separate the entries. For example, to inject samples from vials 1 through 20, enter **1.20**, then press Enter.
- 7. Enter the number of injections from each vial, then press Enter.
- 8. Enter the run time, then press Enter.
- 9. Enter the volume of each injection, then press the OK screen key. The injection sequence begins.

# Chapter 5 Making Automatic Runs

This chapter describes how to set up the Separations Module to make automatic runs in:

- System Controller or No Interaction mode
- · Controlled by Millennium Chromatography Manager modes
- Controlled by MassLynx mode

Refer to <u>Section 1.4</u>, <u>Operating Configurations</u>, for details about Separations Module control modes.

#### System Controller or No Interaction Mode

If your HPLC system uses the Waters 2695 Separations Module in a System Controller or No Interaction mode, you make an automatic run using a sample set or sample template stored in the Separations Module. Chapter 6, Creating Methods, Sample Sets, and Sample Templates, describes how to create and store separation methods, sample sets, and sample templates. You run existing sample sets and sample templates stored in the Separations Module from the Main screen (Figure 5-1).

#### **Controlled by Millennium Chromatography Manager Modes**

If your HPLC system is controlled by the Millennium Chromatography Manager, you make an automatic run using a project, instrument method, and sample set stored in the Millennium Chromatography Manager. For details on making a run using Millennium software, refer to the procedures in <u>Section 5.2, Making Automatic Runs Under Millennium</u> <u>Control</u>.

#### Controlled by MassLynx Mode

If your HPLC system is controlled by Micromass MassLynx software, you make an automatic run using the sample processing list containing the LC method(s) that define the operating parameters of the Separations Module and detector (other than the MS detector) operating parameters. For details on making a run using MassLynx software, refer to <u>Section 5.3</u>, <u>Making Automatic Runs Under Micromass MassLynx Control</u>.

# 5.1 Making Automatic Runs in Stand-Alone Mode




Figure 5-2 Making an Automatic Run in Stand-Alone Mode

<u>Figure 5-2</u> shows the steps for setting up and making an automatic run in a stand-alone configuration (System Controller or No Interaction mode).

#### Loading Sample Sets from a Disk

You can load sample sets, separation methods, and templates from a disk to the Separations Module and then run them. To load a separation method, sample set, or sample template stored on a floppy disk, refer to <u>Section 6.5, Using the Disk Drive</u>.

## 5.1.1 Running a Sample Set

To run a sample set in a stand-alone mode:

 Press the Run Samples screen key in the Main screen. The Run Samples screen appears (Figure 5-3), listing all available separation methods, sample sets, and sample templates. <u>Table 5-1</u> describes the icons used in the Run Samples screen.

- 2. Select the sample set you want to run, then press one of the following screen keys to perform the indicated tasks:
  - Initial Conds Starts the solvent management system at the initial conditions (specified in the first line of the sample set) and begins equilibrating the temperature in the sample heater/cooler and/or column heater. When the system is equilibrated, press the Run screen key.
  - **Run** Displays the selected sample set table (to view or edit), as shown in <u>Figure 5-4</u>. Use the screen keys to modify the table as necessary.

- 3. Load the sample vials into the carousel(s) according to the locations specified in the sample set (<u>Section 4.2</u>, <u>Loading Sample Vials</u>).
- Press the Start screen key. The Run Samples screen appears with a list of the solvents required for the run (Figure 5-5). Check that you have prepared the Separations Module with the indicated solvent(s).

5. Press the **Routine** screen key to start a normal run. To make a stat run, or to modify a run in progress, refer to <u>Section 5.1.4</u>, <u>Modifying a Sample Set During a Run</u>.

# 5.1.2 Viewing Sample Sets

You can display the Sample Set table in one of three views described below. Press the **Next View** screen key to scroll from one view to another.

- Functional View Displays the sample set with one function per line (Figure 5-4). This view gives you a complete overview of the entire run, including vial ranges and any linked rows.
- Injection View Displays the sample set with one injection per line (<u>Figure 5-6</u>). Press the Injects Only screen key to display only those lines that have an injection. This list corresponds directly to the chromatograms produced by the run.
- Loading View Displays the sample set with one vial per line (Figure 5-7). This view shows you how to load samples in the carousel.

## 5.1.3 Making a Run from a Sample Template

You can perform an automated run in a stand-alone mode using a sample template stored in the Separations Module. Refer to <u>Section 6.4</u>, <u>Creating a Sample Template</u>, for the procedure to create and store a sample template. Screen prompts give you step-by-step directions to prepare for the run.

To run a sample template in a stand-alone mode:

- 1. Press the Run Samples screen key in the Main screen. The Run Samples screen appears (Figure 5-3).
- Select the sample template you want to run, then press Enter. The Setup dialog box appears (Figure 5-8).

- 3. Enter the number of samples to run, then press the Continue screen key.
- 4. Enter the location of the first sample vial, then press the **Continue** screen key. You must use consecutive sample vials on one or more carousels.
- 5. Repeat steps 3 and 4 if the sample template includes multiple separation methods.
- 6. Enter the number of standards in the run, then press the Continue screen key.
- 7. Enter the location of the first standard vial, then press the **Continue** screen key. You must use consecutive standard vials.
- 8. Make sure that the solvents listed in the dialog box are primed and in the appropriate inlet tubes, then press the **Start** screen key.

# 5.1.4 Modifying a Sample Set During a Run

You can modify operating conditions during a run in a stand-alone mode by:

- Using the stat run function
- Editing the separation method

#### **Performing a Stat Run**

You can use the stat run function to interrupt a run in progress and perform one or more injections after the current injection is done, then continue with the scheduled run. Performing a stat run is most useful when running separation methods that use identical solvents and temperatures.

To perform a stat run while a sample set is running:

- 1. Load the sample(s) into the carousel, then place the carousel in the sample compartment.
- Press the Run Samples screen key in the Main screen. The Run Samples screen appears (<u>Figure 5-3</u>).
- 3. Select the separation method or sample set you want to use for the stat run, then press the Run screen key.
- 4. Enter the carousel position of the vial(s) and other parameters in the appropriate fields in the screen.
- Press the Start screen key. A screen appears with a list of the solvents required for the run, as shown in <u>Figure 5-5</u>. Check that you have prepared the Separations Module with the indicated solvent(s).
- 6. Press the **Stat** screen key. The stat run starts immediately after the current injection is complete. The original sample set resumes after the stat run is complete.

#### **Editing a Separation Method**

You can modify a separation method while a sample set is running. If the separation method is being used for the current injection, the current injection is not affected by the changes. You must save the changes to the modified separation method before you can apply the method to all subsequent injections that use that separation method. Use the procedures in <u>Section 6.1, Creating and Editing Separation Methods</u>, to modify and save the separation method.

## 5.1.5 Stopping a Run

To stop a run in progress, press one of the following keys from the Status screen:

- **Stop Inject** (screen key) Stops the current injection and displays a dialog box requesting you to abort or resume the injection
- Hold Inject (screen key) Completes the current function, suspends operation of subsequent functions, and displays screen keys that allow you to abort or resume the sample set
- Hold Gradient (screen key) Holds the current gradient conditions. A screen key allows you to resume the gradient

 Stop Flow (on the keypad) – Stops the flow of solvent, suspends operation of the current function, and displays screen keys that allow you to abort or resume the function

If any alarm condition specified in the separation method, sample set, or sample template is set to "Stop Function" or "Stop Flow" and the alarm condition occurs, a dialog box appears notifying you of the alarm condition. The following screen keys are in this dialog box:

- Abort Cancels the current function
- Resume Resumes the current function

# 5.2 Making Automatic Runs Under Millennium Control

If your Separations Module is configured for Millennium Chromatography Manager control (Millennium version 2.xx or Millennium<sup>32</sup>), you make an automatic run from Run Samples in the Millennium software. When the Separations Module is running under Millennium control, the word "Remote" appears in the banner area. Configure your Separations Module for Millennium Chromatography Manager control as described in <u>Section 3.2.2,</u> <u>Configuring the Operating Mode</u>.

#### Making an Automatic Run Using Millennium Software

To make an automatic run, perform the following steps at the Millennium workstation:

- 1. Create a chromatographic system that includes the Waters 2695 Separations Module:
  - For Millennium software version 2.xx, create a system that includes the 2695 solvent management and sample management systems (using two IEEE-488 addresses). Refer to the Millennium documentation for information on creating a chromatographic system.
  - For Millennium<sup>32</sup> software, create a system that includes the Waters 2695 Separations Module (using one IEEE-488 address). Refer to the *Millennium Help* for information on creating a chromatographic system.

**Note:** The 2695 Separations Module is recognized as a 2690 Separations Module by Millennium version 2.xx and Millennium<sup>32</sup> versions 3.2 and earlier.

2. Create a Millennium instrument method that uses the system you created in step 1. Refer to the Millennium documentation for information on creating and/or modifying an instrument method.

**Note:** Any parameter values not explicitly set in the Millennium instrument method automatically take on the values in the Default separation method in the Separations Module.

You can edit the Default separation method in the Separations Module to set parameter values appropriate for your applications. Refer to <u>Section 6.1.2, Editing a</u> <u>Separation Method</u>, for details on editing existing methods.

- Create a method set that uses the instrument method you created in step 2. Refer to the Millennium documentation for information on creating and/or modifying a method set.
- 4. Run the samples using the method set you created in step 3. When you enter Run Samples, use the HPLC system you created in step 1. Refer to the Millennium documentation for information on using Run Samples.
- 5. Process and print out the data acquired from the chromatographic run. Refer to the Millennium documentation for information on developing a processing method.

#### **Considerations When Making Millennium-Controlled Runs**

**Note:** When you start an automatic run using the Millennium Chromatography Manager, any running sample set or method programmed locally at the Separations Module automatically terminates.

**Note:** When the Separations Module is running under Millennium software control and you press Abort in Run Samples, the Separations Module continues running until the current function is completed (including gradient and event functions). Operation continues until any programmed Auto-shutdown procedure begins.

**Note:** You can operate the Separations Module from its front panel whenever Run Samples is not running on the Millennium Chromatography Manager workstation.



**Attention:** Do not edit the Default Method in the Separations Module when the Separations Module is running under Millennium software control. Doing so may cause unexpected behavior.

# 5.3 Making Automatic Runs Under Micromass MassLynx Control

If your Separations Module is configured for MassLynx software control (versions 3.5, or later), you make an automatic run from the MassLynx software. When the Separations Module is running under MassLynx control, the word "Remote" appears in the banner area. Configure your Separations Module for Micromass MassLynx control as described in <u>Section 3.2.2, Configuring the Operating Mode</u>.

#### Making an Automatic Run Using MassLynx Software

To make an automatic run, perform the following steps at the Micromass MassLynx computer:

- 1. Configure an LC/MS system that includes the Separations Module. Refer to MassLynx Help for information on configuring an inlet system.
- From the Inlet Editor, create an LC method for the Separations Module and detector (other than the mass spectrometer). Refer to MassLynx Help for information on using the Inlet Editor.
- 3. Acquire a single sample from the Inlet Editor. To acquire multiple samples, create a sample processing list from the MassLynx Top Level screen. Refer to MassLynx Help for information on sample processing lists and acquisition.
- 4. Process and print out the data acquired from the chromatographic run. Refer to MassLynx Help for information on processing data.

You can operate the Separations Module from its front panel whenever MassLynx is not running.

# Chapter 6 Creating Methods, Sample Sets, and Sample Templates

<u>Chapter 5, Making Automatic Runs</u>, describes how to perform an automatic run in either a stand-alone or remote control mode.

This chapter describes how to create and store the separation methods, sample sets, and sample templates that allow you to make automatic runs when the Separations Module is in the stand-alone System Controller mode. You can store up to 60 methods in the internal memory of the Separations Module.

**Note:** When the number of stored methods approaches the maximum (60), the time to create and save methods increases from a few seconds to over 30 seconds. When 60 methods have been stored, a warning message appears, indicating that memory capacity has been reached.

The Separations Module supports three types of tools for controlling automatic runs in a stand-alone mode:

- · Separation methods
- · Sample sets
- Sample templates

#### **Separation Methods**

The Separations Module uses and stores programs that can automatically run a *separation method*. A separation method consists of time-based and nontime-based conditions that influence the separation, including:

- · Mobile phase composition and flow rate
- Sample temperature
- Column temperature
- I/O parameters

When you run a separation method on another, identically configured Separations Module in an Alliance<sup>®</sup> System, you can reproduce identical separations.

#### **Sample Sets**

A sample set applies *functions* to separation methods. Examples of functions include (inject) sample, purge, prime, and equilibrate. When you combine a function with a separation method, the resulting sample set tells the Separations Module what to do, when to do it, and under what conditions. You can use multiple separation methods in a sample set.

#### **Sample Templates**

Sample templates allow you to preprogram a sample set so the operator needs only to enter the number and location of samples and standards. The sample template then prompts the operator to load and prime the correct solvents for the sample set. As with any sample set, the sample template can use multiple separation methods.

Sample templates are useful in regulatory-compliant laboratories where standard operating procedures are used. Senior personnel can develop, program, and lock the sample template to prevent any unauthorized changes to the sample template. Once the operator has prepared the Separations Module according to the directions on the screen, the sample template can run unattended.

# 6.1 Creating and Editing Separation Methods

You create and edit separation methods using the Methods screen and six method parameter screens. From the Methods screen, you can:

- Create a new separation method
- Edit an existing separation method
- · Copy and then edit an existing method
- Lock a separation method to prevent changes
- Create a sample template




Figure 6-1 Steps in Creating or Editing a Separation Method

Figure 6-1 shows the steps to create and edit separation methods using the front panel of the Separations Module. If your HPLC system is under Millennium software control, refer to the Millennium documentation for the procedures to create and edit method sets in the Millennium Chromatography Manager. If your HPLC system is under MassLynx software control, refer to MassLynx Help for details on using the Inlet Editor to create an LC method.

# 6.1.1 Creating a Separation Method

To create a separation method:

- Press the Develop Methods screen key in the Main screen. The Methods screen (Figure 6-2) appears, displaying the:
  - Type of method (Separations Method, Sample Set, Sample Template)
  - · Date the method was last modified, and by whom
  - Whether the method is locked or unlocked

- 2. Press the New screen key.
- 3. Press the Separation Method screen key.
- 4. Enter a name for the method, then press Enter. The Mobile Phase screen appears. If necessary, refer to <u>Section 3.1.2</u>, <u>Using the Keypad</u>.
- Enter values for all applicable parameters in the Mobile Phase screen and in the other five screens, as appropriate. Press the Next or Previous screen key to scroll through other parameter screens. For details, refer to <u>Section 6.2, Setting</u> <u>Separation Method Parameters</u>.
- 6. To save the method, press Exit, then press the Yes screen key.

# 6.1.2 Editing a Separation Method

To edit an existing separation method:

- 1. Press the **Develop Methods** screen key in the Main screen. The Methods screen appears.
- Select the separation method you want to edit. If the separation method is locked, the Edit screen key is grayed out and a lock icon appears beside the name. To unlock a locked separation method, see <u>Section 6.1.4</u>, <u>Locking and Unlocking a</u> <u>Separation Method</u>.
- 3. Press the Edit screen key.
- 4. Enter the new parameter values in the appropriate screens. For details, refer to <u>Section 6.2, Setting Separation Method Parameters</u>.
- 5. To save the method, press Exit, then press the Yes screen key.

# 6.1.3 Copying and Editing a Separation Method

To copy and edit an existing separation method, leaving the original method unchanged:

- 1. Press the **Develop Methods** screen key in the Main screen. The Methods screen appears.
- 2. Select the separation method you want to copy.
- 3. Press the Copy screen key.
- 4. Enter the name of the new method in the dialog box that appears, then press Enter.

**Note:** The Separations Module automatically adds the appropriate method extension.

- 5. Enter the new parameter values in the appropriate screens. Refer to <u>Section 6.2,</u> <u>Setting Separation Method Parameters</u>, for details.
- 6. To save the method, press Exit, then press the Yes screen key.

#### 6.1.4 Locking and Unlocking a Separation Method

To prevent changes to a separation method, you can lock the method. To lock a separation method:

- 1. Press the **Develop Methods** screen key in the Main screen. The Methods screen appears.
- 2. Select the method you want to lock, then press the Lock screen key.
- Enter a key word in the dialog box that appears, then press Enter. You can use up to 30 alphanumeric characters. The method is locked and cannot be changed, deleted, or renamed until it is unlocked. If necessary, refer to <u>Section 3.1.2, Using the</u> <u>Keypad</u>.
- 4. Record the key word and keep it in a safe place.

To unlock the current method:

- 1. Press the **Develop Methods** screen key in the Main screen. The Methods screen appears.
- Select the method you want to unlock, then press the Unlock screen key.
- Enter the key word in the dialog box that appears, then press Enter. The method is unlocked.

# 6.2 Setting Separation Method Parameters

You enter separation method parameters in six different screens, which are arranged in the order shown in <u>Table 6-1</u>. Each screen is described in the sections of this manual cited in the Reference column of <u>Table 6-1</u>.

## 6.2.1 Setting Mobile Phase Screen Parameter Values

The Mobile Phase screen (Figure 6-3) appears when you select the separation method to edit. Press the **Next** or **Previous** screen keys to move among the six method parameter screens. The icon between the Next and Previous screen keys shows where you are in the sequence of the six screens. Press **Exit** to return to the Methods screen. A dialog box prompts you to save the changes to the separation method.

To enter parameters in the Mobile Phase screen:

 Press the Next or Prev screen key (if necessary) to display the Mobile Phase screen (Figure 6-3).

#### Alarms

The Separations Module maintains a log of all enabled errors that occur during operation. Each error can produce a variety of responses, as shown in <u>Table 6-3</u>.

Alarm Response	Function
Disable	All alarm response reporting is disabled.
Log Quietly	The error is entered into the error log without alerting the operator.
Alert User	The error is entered into the error log and the operator is alerted with a dialog box.
Stop Funct	The error is entered into the error log, the operator is alerted with a dialog box, and operation is suspended at the end of the current function. You can abort or resume the operation of the sample set by pressing the appropriate screen key.
Stop Flow	The error is entered into the error log, the operator is alerted with a dialog box, the current function is suspended, and solvent flow is stopped.

#### **Setting Gradient Table Parameter Values**

The Gradient table allows you to make time-based changes to the composition of the mobile phase during a run. You can program up to 25 lines in the Gradient table.

To set the parameters in the Gradient table:

1. Press the **Gradient** screen key in the Mobile Phase screen to display the Gradient screen (Figure 6-4).

### 6.2.5 Setting I/O Parameter Values

You set the I/O parameter values when you want to use analog signals to notify other instruments of the status of the Separations Module. For example, you may want to:

- · Notify a detector that an injection has begun

- · Notify a third-party data system or integrator that an event has occurred
- · Activate a switching valve
- Sound a buzzer




Figure 6-10 Detectors Screen

# 6.3 Creating and Editing a Sample Set

A sample set is a table of instructions that the Separations Module uses to perform an automated run in a stand-alone mode. During a run, the Separations Module performs the function in each row of the table sequentially.

To create and edit a Sample Set:

- 1. Press the **Develop Methods** screen key in the Main screen. The Methods screen appears.
- 2. Press the New screen key.
- 3. Press the Sample Set screen key.
- Name the sample set, then press Enter. The Sample Set screen appears (Figure 6-16).

#### Note: The Separations Module automatically adds the appropriate extension.




Figure 6-17 Auto Standards Dialog Box

- 3. Enter the location of each standard vial and its capacity in the Source Vial(s) table.

When you start the run, the Separations Module runs the standard. When the current standards vial is empty (based on the number of injections, the size of the injections, and the total volume), the Separations Module automatically advances to the next standards vial specified in the Source Vial(s) table.

### Auto Add

Use the Auto Add function to make an injection that is composed of aliquots from up to ten vials, one of which is the sample vial. The total volume of this injection must be less than the volume of the sample loop. You can specify a delay time to allow the sample to passively mix once sample from all vials is in the sample loop.

To use the Auto Add function:

 Select AutoAdd from the drop-down list of functions, then press the Row Details screen key to display the Auto Add dialog box (<u>Figure 6-18</u>).

- 2. Enter the vial from which you want to withdraw the first portion of the sample. Press **Clear** to set the vial to "sample."
- 3. Enter the volume (in  $\mu$ L) of the sample you want to withdraw.
- 4. Repeat steps 2 and 3 for subsequent portions of the sample.
- 5. Enter the delay time (in minutes) to allow the combined sample to mix.
- 6. Press **OK** to return to the Sample Set screen.

In the Figure 6-18 example, vials 3 and 4 are "reagents" that react with compounds in the sample vial. In Figure 6-19, vials 25 to 30 are the *sample* vials used for the Auto Add. The Separations Module draws 15  $\mu$ L from vial 3, 10  $\mu$ L from vial 25, 50  $\mu$ L from vial 4, then holds the three aliquots in the sample loop for the specified 3.00 minutes before making the injection. The process is repeated for vials 26 to 30.

### 6.3.2 Linking Rows in a Sample Set

You can link together one or more rows in a sample set. This allows you to perform multiple functions for the same set of vials. For example, you can link an inject sample function with a purge function, as shown in Figure 6-19. In this example, two 15- $\mu$ L injections are made from vial 5, followed by a purge. The process is repeated for each vial that you specify.



Attention: When unlinking or deleting linked rows in a sample set, vial numbers in the remaining rows may differ from those originally entered. Make sure that vial numbers for all rows are correct before running the sample set.

To link rows:

- 1. Select the row you want to link.
- 2. Press the More screen key, then press the Make Link screen key. The current row is linked with the previous row.

To unlink lines:

- 1. Select the row you want to unlink.
- 2. Press the More screen key, then press the Break Link screen key.

# 6.4 Creating a Sample Template

A sample template allows you to define the major parameters of a run and then enter variable parameters, such as number of vials, vial position, and so forth. just before you begin the run.

To create a sample template:

- 1. Create a sample set as described in <u>Section 6.3</u>, <u>Creating and Editing a Sample</u> <u>Set</u>.
- Press the Methods screen key in the Main screen. The Methods screen appears (Figure 6-2).
- 3. Select the sample set you want to serve as a sample template.
- 4. Press the Make Tpl screen key. To lock the template, use the procedure in <u>Section 6.1.4, Locking and Unlocking a Separation Method</u>.

# 6.5 Using the Disk Drive

You can use the floppy disk drive in the Separations Module to store and retrieve separation methods, sample sets, and sample templates to 1.44-MB, standard PC-formatted floppy disks. Also, by saving reports and tables to a floppy disk, you can use the disk drive as an alternative to a hard-copy printer.

### **Exporting Methods**

To export one or more separation methods, sample sets, or sample templates to a floppy disk:

- 1. Insert a preformatted 3.5-inch disk into the floppy disk drive.




Figure 6-20 Methods Screen

- Press the Methods screen key in the Main screen, then press the More screen key twice to access the Export Method and Import Method screen keys. The Methods screen appears, as shown in <u>Figure 6-20</u>.

 Select the method you want to export to the disk, then press Select Method. To select an additional method, select the desired method, then press Select Method again.

To select all methods except the Default method:

- a. Select the **Default** method, then press the **Select Method** screen key.
- b. Press the Invert Choices screen key. All methods except the Default method are selected.
- 5. When you have selected all the methods you want to transfer, press the **Export** Now screen key. The file transfer begins.

### **Importing Methods**

To import one or more methods from a floppy disk:

- 1. Insert the disk that contains the method(s) into the floppy disk drive.
- Press the Methods screen key in the Main screen, then press the More screen key twice to access the Export Method and Import Method screen keys. The Methods screen appears, as shown in <u>Figure 6-20</u>.
- Press the Import Methods screen key. The Import Methods screen appears, displaying a list of methods stored on the disk (<u>Figure 6-22</u>). To update the list, press the Refresh screen key.

- Select the method you want to import into the Separations Module, then press the Select Method screen key. To select additional methods, select each method and press Select Method again.
- 5. When you have selected all the methods you want to import, press the **Import Now** screen key. The file transfer begins.



Attention: Do not remove the floppy disk from the drive before the import is complete; the Separations Module cannot detect a partially imported method. Waters recommends that you carefully review any imported method before you run the method.

#### **Error Messages**

During the Import process, error messages may occur during a transfer of file data.

- An error message appears if you attempt to import a method that already exists in the Separations Module. You can choose to overwrite the existing method.
- An error message appears if you attempt to transfer more than 60 methods into the Separations Module.

# Chapter 7 Maintenance

This chapter describes routine maintenance procedures you can perform to ensure the Waters 2695 Separations Module consistently provides accurate and precise results.

# 7.1 Maintenance Considerations

### **Safety and Handling**

When you perform maintenance procedures on your 2695 Separations Module, keep the following safety considerations in mind.



**Attention:** To avoid damaging electrical parts, never disconnect an electrical assembly while power is applied to the 2695 Separations Module. Once power is turned off, wait 10 seconds before you disconnect an assembly.

**Attention:** Practice proper electro-static discharge (ESD) protection to prevent damage to internal circuitry. Do not touch integrated circuit chips or other components that do not specifically require manual adjustment.



STOP

**Caution:** To prevent injury, always observe good laboratory practices when you handle solvents, change tubing, or operate the 2695 Separations Module. Know the physical and chemical properties of the solvents you use. Refer to the Material Safety Data Sheets for the solvents in use.



*Caution:* To avoid the possibility of electric shock, do not open the power supply cover. The power supply does not contain user-serviceable parts.

### **Proper Operating Procedures**

To keep your 2695 Separations Module running smoothly, follow the operating procedures and guidelines described in <u>Chapter 3, Preparing the 2695 Separations Module</u> for Operation.

### **Spare Parts**

Refer to <u>Appendix B, Spare Parts</u>, for spare part information. Parts not included in Appendix B are not recommended for replacement by the customer.

### 2695 Separations Module Maintenance Protocol

<u>Table 7-1</u> lists the maintenance and diagnostic protocols you should follow on an annual basis to ensure uninterrupted operation of the 2695 Separations Module. If you use the system often (for example, during nights and weekends), or if you use aggressive solvents, such as buffers, you may need to perform the following maintenance more frequently.

# 7.2 Maintaining the Solvent Management System

Perform the procedures in this section when you determine there is a problem with a specific component in the solvent management system. For information about isolating problems in the solvent management system, see Chapter 8, Diagnostics and Troubleshooting.



**Caution:** To prevent injury, always observe good laboratory practices when you handle solvents, change tubing, or operate the 2695 Separations Module. Know the physical and chemical properties of the solvents you use. Refer to the Material Safety Data Sheets for the solvents in use.

### 7.2.1 Overview

Maintaining the solvent management system involves:

• Replacing the plunger seals

- Replacing the seal-wash seals
- Cleaning and replacing a plunger
- Replacing an inlet check valve
- Replacing the inline filter

For a complete list of spare parts, see Appendix B, Spare Parts.

Attention: To ensure proper drip protection, be sure the solvent delivery and solvent conditioning trays are resecured in place with screws before you operate the system.




Figure 7-1 Solvent Management System Components

<u>Figure 7-1</u> illustrates the various solvent management system components (with the solvent delivery tray pulled out). <u>Table 7-2</u> describes the functions of these components.

Primary Piston Chamber	Draws in/expels solvent as part of serial flow design.
Accumulator Piston Chamber	Draws in/expels solvent as part of serial flow design.
Prime/Vent Valve	Allows solvent purging, priming, and venting.
Seal-Wash Pump	Provides solvent to wash the seals of the primary and accumulator plungers.
Primary Inlet Check Valve	Maintains flow direction in the primary piston chamber by opening in one direction only (opens on the plunger intake stroke, closes on the delivery stroke).
Accumulator Inlet Check Valve	Maintains flow direction in the accumulator piston chamber by opening in one direction only (opens on the plunger intake stroke, closes on the delivery stroke).
Primary Transducer	Senses backpressure developed by resistance to solvent flow in the primary piston chamber.
System Transducer	Senses backpressure developed by resistance to solvent flow in the HPLC system.
Inline Filter	Provides solvent filtering between the solvent manage- ment system and the sample management system.

### 7.2.2 Removing the Head, Seal-Wash Assembly, and Plunger

*Note:* For information about isolating problems in the solvent management system, see Chapter 8, Diagnostics and Troubleshooting.




Figure 7-2 Solvent Management System Piston Chamber Components (Exploded View)

<u>Figure 7-2</u> shows the head, head nut, plunger, seal wash assembly, and check valve assembly of each solvent delivery piston chamber. For a list of replacement parts, see <u>Appendix B</u>, <u>Spare Parts</u>.

Remove the head, seal-wash assembly, and plunger whenever you need to:

- Replace the plunger seals
- Clean or replace a plunger
- Service the seal-wash seals

### Procedure

To remove the head, seal-wash assembly, and plunger:

- 1. Press the Diag screen key in the Main screen.
- 2. Press the Other Tests screen key in the Diagnostics screen.
- 3. Select Head Removal and Replacement from the list in the Other Diagnostics screen.
- 4. Follow the directions that appear in the Head Removal and Replacement screen.
- 5. Remove the head, seal wash assembly, and plunger as one unit (Figure 7-5).

For more information about removing the head, see <u>Section 8.4.5</u>, <u>Performing the Head</u> <u>Removal and Replacement Utility</u>.

# 7.2.3 Replacing the Plunger Seals

**Note:** For information about isolating problems in the solvent management system, see Chapter 8, Diagnostics and Troubleshooting.




Figure 7-3 Plunger and Face Seal Orientation

**Note:** To ensure optimum performance, replace the plunger seal in a head when you perform service. Replace the face seals after you have replaced the plunger seal two or three times (see <u>Figure 7-3</u>).

**Note:** The standard seals in the Separations Module are manufactured with Fluoroloy<sup>™</sup>-G, an ultra-high molecular weight polyethylene material. Extensive testing has indicated that these seals exhibit excellent lifetimes for the majority of solvents typically used in HPLC separations methods. If you find these seals perform unsatisfactorily for your applications, contact Waters for alternative plunger seals manufactured with graphite-filled Teflon material (part number WAT271066), or Alliance ClearSeal (part number 700001326).

This procedure involves replacing the:

- Plunger seal
- Inlet face seal
- Outlet face seal

### **Required Materials**

- Seal insertion tool (in Startup Kit)
- Seal removal tool (part number WAT039803)
- Replacement seals
- Squeeze bottle with 100% alcohol (methanol or isopropanol)
- Clean block, such as a detector cell window (part number WAT097295)
- Syringe (in Startup Kit)
- · Plastic tweezers or can of compressed air

### **Plunger Seal Replacement**



Attention: To avoid damaging the sealing surfaces, use the seal removal tool. Do **not** use a sharp tool to remove or install seals.

To replace the plunger seal:

- 1. Remove the head as described in <u>Section 7.2.2, Removing the Head, Seal-Wash</u> <u>Assembly, and Plunger</u>.
- Use the plastic end of the seal removal tool to remove the plunger seal from the head (<u>Figure 7-3</u>).

- 3. Wet the insertion tool, seal opening, and new plunger seal with 100% alcohol before you install the seal.
- 4. Place the new plunger seal on the seal insertion tool with the spring side facing away from the tool. Insert the tip of the tool into the plunger seal opening in the head (see Figure 7-3), then push firmly to install the seal.

### **Face Seal Replacement**



**Attention:** To avoid damage to the sealing surfaces, use the seal removal tool. Do **not** use a sharp tool to remove or install seals. Replace face seals after every two or three plunger seal replacements.

To replace the face seals:

- 1. Remove the head as described in <u>Section 7.2.2, Removing the Head, Seal-Wash</u> <u>Assembly, and Plunger</u>.
- Direct compressed air into the center of the face seal or use plastic tweezers to remove the inlet and outlet face seals from the seal openings in the head (Figure 7-3).
- 3. Wet the new seals and seal openings with 100% alcohol.
- 4. Place the new face seals in the face seal openings in the head.
- 5. Use an alcohol-cleaned, flat object, such as a detector window, to firmly press the face seals into the openings on the pump head.

- 7. Follow the directions on the screen to reinsert the head, seal wash housing, washer, and plunger assemblies. To avoid damaging the tube seals and to properly align the seal wash tubes with the seal wash housing, refer to steps a through d below. Also, make sure that the head alignment pin is properly oriented and that the "J" tube is facing down (Figure 7-5).
  - a. After finger tightening the head nut onto the head, loosen (turn counterclockwise) the nut approximately 1/2-turn.
  - b. Inspect the ends of the seal wash tubes for damage. If necessary, trim the ends with a razor blade.
  - c. Reinsert the seal wash tubes into the manifold, then fully tighten the head nut.
  - d. Return the release ring to the run position.
- 8. If the Separations Module does not have solvent in the lines, perform a dry prime to draw solvent into the plunger cavity before you perform a wet prime or start delivery of solvents (see <u>Section 3.3.4, Priming the Solvent Management System</u>).

### 7.2.4 Replacing the Seal-Wash Assembly Seals

*Note:* For information about isolating problems in the solvent management system, see Chapter 8, Diagnostics and Troubleshooting.

This procedure involves replacing the:

- · Seal-wash face seal
- Two tube seals
- Plunger wash seal

### **Required Materials**

- Seal insertion tool (in Startup Kit)
- Seal removal tool (part number WAT039803)
- Replacement seals
- Squirt bottle with 100% alcohol (methanol or isopropanol)
- Syringe (in Startup Kit)
- Plastic tweezers

### Procedure



Attention: To avoid damaging the sealing surfaces, use the seal removal tool. Do **not** use a sharp tool to remove or install seals.

To replace the seal-wash assembly seals:

- 1. Remove the seal wash assembly as described in <u>Section 7.2.2, Removing the</u> <u>Head, Seal-Wash Assembly, and Plunger</u>.




Figure 7-4 Seal-Wash Assembly Seals

- 2. Use the plastic end of the seal removal tool to remove the plunger wash seal from its seat. Repeat this procedure for each of the tube seals (Figure 7-4).
- 3. Use the plastic tweezers to remove the seal wash face seal (Figure 7-4).

- 4. Wet the seal insertion tool, each new seal, and seal opening with 100% alcohol before you install the seal.
- Place the new plunger wash seal on the seal insertion tool with the spring side facing away from the seal insertion tool (Figure 7-4) and insert the tip of the tool into the seal opening, then push firmly to install the seal. Repeat this procedure for each of the tube seals.
- 6. Install the new seal (Figure 7-4) by pressing the seal into the cavity with your thumb.




Figure 7-5 Plunger, Seal-Wash, and Head

- 7. Reinstall the seal wash housing assembly washer (see Figure 7-5).
- Slide the seal wash housing with washer onto the plunger, then insert the assembly onto the head (<u>Figure 7-5</u>).
- 9. Follow the directions in the Head Removal and Replacement screen to reinsert the head, seal wash assembly, and plunger. To avoid damaging the tube seals and to

- a. After finger tightening the head nut onto the head, loosen (turn counterclockwise) the nut approximately 1/2-turn.
- b. Inspect the ends of the seal-wash tubes for damage. If necessary, trim the ends with a razor blade.
- c. Reinsert the seal wash tubes into the manifold, then fully tighten the head nut.
- d. Return the release ring to the run position.
- If the Separations Module does not have solvent in the lines, perform a dry prime of the solvent management system to draw solvent into the plunger cavity before you perform a wet prime or start delivery of solvents (see <u>Section 3.3.4, Priming the</u> <u>Solvent Management System</u>).

# 7.2.5 Cleaning and Replacing a Plunger

*Note:* For information about isolating problems in the solvent management system, see Chapter 8, Diagnostics and Troubleshooting.

### **Required Materials**

- Pumice, fine
- Cotton swab
- Water, HPLC-grade

### **Cleaning the Plunger**

To clean the plunger:

- 1. Remove the head, seal-wash assembly, and plunger as described in <u>Section 7.2.2,</u> <u>Removing the Head, Seal-Wash Assembly, and Plunger</u>.
- Inspect the plunger for damage, excessive wear, or mobile-phase residue without separating it from the pump head and seal wash assembly (<u>Figure 7-5</u>). If the plunger seal has mobile-phase residue:
  - Separate the plunger from the head and seal-wash housing assembly.
  - Clean the plunger with a fine pumice to remove any coating.
  - Rinse the plunger thoroughly with water to remove all traces of abrasive, then wipe clean.
- 3. Reinspect the plunger. If the plunger shows excessive wear, replace the plunger.

If necessary, replace the plunger seal and face seals as described in <u>Section 7.2.3,</u> <u>Replacing the Plunger Seals</u>.

### **Replacing the Plunger**

To replace the plunger:

- 1. Slide the seal wash housing with washer onto the new plunger, then insert the assembly into the head (Figure 7-2).
- Follow the directions in the Head Removal and Replacement screen to reinsert the head, seal wash assembly, and plunger. To avoid damaging the tube seals and to properly align the seal wash tubes with the seal wash housing, refer to steps a through d below. Also, make sure that the head alignment pin is properly oriented and that the "J" tube is facing down (<u>Figure 7-5</u>).
  - a. After finger tightening the head nut onto the head, loosen (turn counterclockwise) the nut approximately 1/2-turn.
  - b. Inspect the ends of the seal-wash tubes for damage. If necessary, use a razor blade to trim the ends.
  - c. Reinsert the seal wash tubes into the manifold, then fully tighten the head nut.
  - d. Return the release ring to the run position.
- If the Separations Module does not have solvent in the lines, perform a dry prime of the solvent management system to draw solvent into the plunger cavity before you perform a wet prime or start delivery of solvents (see <u>Section 4.4.1, Performing a</u> <u>Dry Prime</u>).

# 7.2.6 Replacing an Inlet Check Valve Cartridge

**Note:** For information about isolating check valve problems, see <u>Chapter 8, Diagnostics</u> <u>and Troubleshooting</u>.

### **Required Materials**

- Wrench, 1/2-inch, open-end
- Wrench, 5/16-inch, open-end
- Replacement check valve cartridge
- Squirt bottle with 100% alcohol (methanol or isopropanol)
- Syringe (in Startup Kit)

### Procedure

To replace an inlet check valve on either piston chamber:

- 1. Select Motors and Valves in the Other Diagnostics screen. Make sure that the GPV valve is set to the Off position (see <u>Section 8.4.1, Performing the Motors and Valves</u> <u>Diagnostic</u>).
- 2. Loosen the screws that secure the solvent delivery and solvent conditioning trays and pull the trays out a few inches to access the check valves (Figure 7-1).




Figure 7-6 Inlet Check Valve

- 3. Use the 1/2-inch wrench to hold the inlet check valve housing while you disconnect the inlet check valve compression screw with the 5/16-inch wrench (Figure 7-6).
- Use the 1/2-inch wrench to disconnect the check valve housing from the manifold (Figure 7-6).

- 5. Tip the inlet check valve housing upside down to remove the old check valve cartridge.
- 6. Inspect the inlet check valve housing and clean it if necessary. Wet the housing with 100% alcohol.
- 7. Wet the new check valve cartridge with 100% alcohol.
- 8. Insert the replacement check valve cartridge into the inlet check valve housing.



Attention: Make sure that the arrow on the check valve cartridge points toward the piston chamber.

- 9. Insert the inlet check valve housing into the piston chamber housing, then finger-tighten the check valve housing.
- 10. Use the 1/2-inch wrench to tighten the inlet check valve housing 1/8 of a turn.
- 11. Use the1/2-inch wrench to hold the check valve housing while you reinstall and tighten the compression screw into the check valve housing with the 5/16-inch wrench.
- Select Motors and Valves from the Other Diagnostics screen. Set the GPV valve to the Solvent A position (see <u>Section 8.4.1, Performing the Motors and Valves</u> <u>Diagnostic</u>).
- If the Separations Module does not have solvent in the lines, perform a dry prime of the solvent management system to draw solvent into the plunger cavity before you perform a wet prime or start delivery of solvents (see <u>Section 4.4.1, Performing a</u> <u>Dry Prime</u>).

# 7.2.7 Replacing the Inline Filter

The inline filter provides solvent filtering between the solvent management system and the sample management system. Clean and replace the inline filter element when it is the source of elevated backpressure.

**Note:** For information about isolating problems in the solvent management system, see <u>Chapter 8, Diagnostics and Troubleshooting</u>.


### **Required Materials**

- Wrenches, 5/8-inch, open-end, two
- Wrench, 5/16-inch, open-end
- Squirt bottle with 100% alcohol (methanol or isopropanol)
- Absorbent tissue
- Replacement inline filter element

### Procedure

To replace the Inline Filter:

- Use a 5/8-inch wrench and a 5/16-inch wrench to disconnect the compression screw on the left side of the inline filter from the inlet housing (<u>Figure 7-7</u>). Use an absorbent tissue to absorb the small amount of solvent that may leak.
- 2. Use a 5/8-inch wrench to hold the filter outlet housing while you loosen the inlet housing with another 5/8-inch wrench (Figure 7-7).
- 3. Tip the inlet housing upside down to remove the inline filter element.
- 4. Wet the replacement inline filter element with alcohol.
- Insert the replacement inline filter element into the inline filter housing as shown in (Figure 7-7).

- 6. Reconnect the inline filter inlet and outlet housings.
- 7. Retighten the compression screw into the inlet housing.
- 8. Flush the solvent management system with mobile phase at 1 mL/min for 10 minutes (see <u>Section 3.6, Powering Off the Separations Module</u>).
- 9. Inspect the inline filter for leaks, and tighten the fittings as required.

# 7.3 Maintaining the Sample Management System

Perform the procedures in this section when you determine there is a problem with a specific component in the sample management system.

**Note:** For information about isolating problems in the sample management system, see <u>Chapter 8, Diagnostics and Troubleshooting</u>.



**Caution:** To prevent injury, always observe good laboratory practices when you handle solvents, change tubing, or operate the 2695 Separations Module. Know the physical and chemical properties of the solvents you use. Refer to the Material Safety Data Sheets for the solvents in use.

### 7.3.1 Overview

Maintaining the sample management system involves:

- · Replacing the lower needle wash frit
- Replacing the syringe
- · Replacing the needle and seal pack
- Cleaning the sample compartment

For a complete list of spare parts, see Appendix B, Spare Parts.




Figure 7-8 Sample Management System Components (Front View)




Figure 7-9 Sample Management System Components (Right-Side View)

<u>Figure 7-8</u> and <u>Figure 7-9</u> illustrate the various assemblies and components of the sample management system. <u>Table 7-3</u> describes the functions of each assembly and component.

# 7.3.2 Replacing the Lower Needle-Wash Frit

Replace the lower needle-wash frit when:

- Ghost peaks appear in the chromatogram
- Sample carryover is evident
- Scheduled preventive maintenance is required (every 6 months or 5000 injections)

#### **Replacement Parts**

The one-piece needle-wash frit is available as a spare part. For replacement spare part numbers, refer to <u>Appendix B, Spare Parts</u>.

#### **Required Parts**

- Squirt bottle with 100% alcohol (methanol or isopropanol)
- Vial of needle-wash solvent being used or alternatively 100% alcohol (methanol or isopropanol)
- Replacement one-piece needle-wash frit

#### Procedure

**Note:** Immerse the replacement frit for several minutes in a vial of the needle-wash solvent being used, or alternatively in alcohol before beginning the replacement procedure.

To replace the lower frit:




Figure 7-10 Locating the Lower Frit Retainer

- 1. Open the sample carousel door as shown in Figure 7-10.
- Remove all carousels that restrict access to the lower retainer. Use the Door is Open dialog box to move the carousel carrier to the "A" position. Refer to <u>Section 3.4.4, Loading Carousels</u>, for details.
- 3. Power off the 2695 Separations Module and disconnect it from the electrical outlet.
- 4. Find the lower frit retainer, which is inside the sample compartment on the top-right side, approximately 4 inches within the cavity. Refer to Figure 7-10.

- 5. Unscrew the lower frit retainer by hand using a counterclockwise motion.
- 6. Remove the frit from the retainer by inserting a small-diameter pick (or paper clip) through the hole in the retainer cap. Discard the old frit.
- 7. Install the new frit, which has been immersed and wetted; seating it completely in the retainer.

- 8. Reinstall the lower retainer using a clockwise motion. Screw the retainer in by hand until it is firmly seated.
- 9. Reconnect the 2695 Separations Module to the electrical outlet and power on the unit.
- 10. Reinstall the sample carousels and close the sample carousel door.
- 11. Prime the needle-wash pump. Refer to <u>Section 3.4.2, Priming the Needle-Wash</u> <u>Pump</u>.

# 7.3.3 Replacing the Syringe

**Note:** For information about isolating problems in the sample management system, see <u>Chapter 8, Diagnostics and Troubleshooting</u>.

Replace the syringe if:

- The plunger tip becomes worn
- You want to change to the optional 25-µL or 2500-µL syringe size



Attention: To ensure accurate results, use only syringes that are approved by Waters for use in the sample management system. See <u>Appendix B, Spare Parts</u>, for a listing of Waters-approved syringes.

#### **Required Material**

Replacement syringe

#### **Removing the Syringe**

To remove the syringe:

- 1. Set the flow rate to 0.000 mL/min.
- 2. Open the syringe compartment door.




Figure 7-11 Syringe Assembly Components

- Remove the knurled nut that holds the syringe barrel to the syringe mounting bracket (<u>Figure 7-11</u>).

- 4. Press the Diag screen key in the Main screen. The Diagnostics screen appears.
- 5. Press the Other Tests screen key. The Other Tests screen appears.
- 6. Select Motors and Valves. The Motors and Valves screen appears.
- Check that valve V3 is open. If V3 is closed, select the V3 valve and enter any number on the keypad to toggle the valve to the open position. Press Enter to save the change.
- 8. Select the Syringe Position field.
  - a. Press Enter to display the drop-down list.
  - b. Select the Full field.

With the knurled nut removed, the plunger tip remains up as the mounting bracket is lowered.

- 9. When the mounting bracket is fully lowered, unscrew the syringe assembly from the mounting bracket as follows:
  - a. Grasp the syringe barrel near the mounting bracket.
  - b. Turn the syringe counterclockwise until it is released from the mounting bracket.

### Installing a New Syringe

If you need to install a syringe different in size from the original syringe, refer to <u>Table 7-4</u> for available syringe sizes. Be sure to enter the new syringe size in the Configuration screen. (See the "Modifying Syringe Configuration Parameters" discussion later.)

Table 7-4 Syringe Sizes

Standard Size	Optional Sizes
250-µL	25-μL, 2500-μL

#### **Configuring and Initializing the Syringe**

To connect and initialize the syringe:

- 1. Partially fill the new syringe with mobile phase (to help remove air bubbles) before you insert the syringe in the mounting bracket.
- 2. Screw the new syringe partially into the mounting bracket. Do not tighten.




Figure 7-12 Installing the Syringe

- 3. Push the syringe plunger down so that the threaded end slides through the syringe guide mounting bracket.
- 4. Hand-tighten the syringe.

- 5. Press Other Tests in the Diagnostic screen. The Other Tests screen appears.
- 6. Select the Syringe Position field, then press Enter to display the drop-down list.
- 7. Select Empty, then press Enter. The mounting bracket moves upward to allow you to install the knurled nut.
- 8. Press the Exit key to exit the Other Tests screen.
- 9. Install and finger-tighten the knurled nut.

#### Modifying Syringe Configuration Parameters

If the replacement syringe differs in size from the original syringe, you need to configure the 2695 Separations Module for a new syringe size according to the following procedure (see Figure 3-5).

- Press the Configure screen key in the Main screen to display the Configuration screen.
- Select the Syringe Size field. In the drop-down menu, select the appropriate syringe size, then press Enter.
- 3. Press the Exit key to return to the Main screen.

**Note:** For more information about changing the syringe size, see <u>Section 3.2, Configuring</u> <u>the Separations Module</u>.

#### Purging the Sample Management System

Once you have installed a new syringe, purge the sample management system with at least six sample loop volumes to remove any bubbles that may exist in the system.

To purge the sample management system:

- 1. Press the Menu/Status key to display the Control screen.
- 2. Select <direct> in the Method field.
- 3. Set the pump to deliver **1** mL/min of degassed or sparged 100% methanol.
- Select the purge cycle parameters:
  - a. Press the Direct Function screen key.
  - b. Select Purge Injector, then press Enter.
  - c. Enter 6 in the Number of Sample Loop Volumes field, then press Enter.
  - d. Select the Compression Test check box to perform a compression test (to check for air bubbles in the syringe).
- 5. Press **OK** to start the purge cycle.

**Note:** For more information about purging the sample management system, see <u>Section 3.4.1, Purging the Sample Management System</u>.

# 7.3.4 Replacing the Needle and Seal Pack

**Note:** Use the optional PerformancePLUS nickel/cobalt needle (part number 700001326) to reduce loss of proteins that adhere to the standard stainless steel needle.

Replace the needle and seal pack when:

- The needle is bent.
- The tip of the needle is damaged.
- Contaminant peaks appear in the chromatogram that cannot be corrected by changing the wash solvent in the needle wash system.

**Note:** For information about isolating problems in the sample management system, see <u>Chapter 8, Diagnostics and Troubleshooting</u>.

The procedure for replacing the needle involves:

- Removing the injector
- Removing the seal pack
- Removing and replacing the needle
- Installing the injector
- Installing the new seal pack
- Adjusting the seal pack

#### **Required Materials**

- Wrench, T-10 TORX
- Wrench, T-20 TORX
- Wrenches, 5/16-inch, two
- Squirt bottle with 100% alcohol (methanol or isopropanol)
- Screwdriver, long, flat-blade

#### **Required Kits**

You need one of the following kits to replace the seal pack:

- Seal Pack Assembly and Needle Kit Includes an assembled seal pack, replacement needle, and instructions
- Seal Pack Seal Replacement Kit Includes seal pack seals, frits, replacement needle, and instructions

#### **Removing the Injector**

To remove the injector:

1. Power off the 2695 Separations Module.

- 2. Remove the top and right side panels to locate the injector assembly (Figure 7-9).




Figure 7-13 Removing the Injector

- Disconnect the injector motor and sensor cables from the circuit board (Figure 7-13).
- 4. Use the long flat-blade screwdriver to loosen the two mounting screws securing the injector to the floor of the sample compartment (Figure 7-13).
- 5. Disconnect the sample loop from the injector (Figure 7-13).




Figure 7-14 Removing the Seal Pack

- 6. Lift the injector assembly a few inches and remove the seal pack high-pressure fitting (see Figure 7-14).
- 7. Carefully lay the injector on its side on a clean surface.

### **Removing the Seal Pack**

To remove the seal pack:

- 1. Disconnect the tubes attached the needle wash lines (Figure 7-14).
- 2. Use a TORX T-10 wrench to remove the three mounting screws and washers that hold the seal pack to the base of the injector (Figure 7-14).
- 3. Pull the seal pack out of the injector.

### **Removing and Replacing the Needle**

To remove and replace the needle:




Figure 7-15 Replacing the Needle

- 1. Unscrew the compression screw on the needle (Figure 7-15).
- 2. Pull the needle down and remove it.
- 3. Rotate the motor shaft until the needle mounting block is as high as it can go.



**Attention:** To prevent damaging the needle, hold the needle only at the end away from the needle port. Use a clean wipe and 100% alcohol to clean the needle after installation.

- 4. Slide the compression screw and ferrule onto the end of the replacement needle.
- 5. Push the needle into the needle mounting block until it is firmly seated. Hand-tighten the compression screw.




Figure 7-16 Aligning the Needle Port

- 6. Check the orientation of the needle port. Be sure that it faces toward the outlet (red) line of the seal pack (Figure 7-16).



**Attention:** To prevent chromatographic inconsistencies, make sure the orientation of the needle port is correct.

# **Reinstalling the Seal Pack and Injector**



Attention: To prevent damaging the injector, ensure that the needle wash tubing is not pinched between the injector and the base.

To reinstall the injector:

- 1. Lower the injector into the base, fitting the guide pins in place.
- 2. Reconnect the high-pressure seal pack inlet and outlet (red) fittings (Figure 7-14).
- 3. Connect the two needle wash lines (Figure 7-14). Connect the green line to the upper seal wash body, and the yellow line to the lower seal wash body.
- 4. Insert the new seal pack into the base of the injector (Figure 7-14).
- 5. Secure the seal pack with the three mounting screws and washers.
- Attach the injector to the floor of the compartment by tightening the two mounting screws (<u>Figure 7-13</u>).
- 7. Connect the injector motor and sensor cables from the circuit board (Figure 7-13).
- 8. Reinstall the right side panel.
- 9. Power on the 2695 Separations Module.

# Adjusting the Seal Pack

The seal pack must be adjusted after you reinstall the injector.

Seal pack adjustment involves:

- 1. Purging the sample management system See <u>Section 3.4.1, Purging the Sample</u> <u>Management System</u>.
- 2. Adjusting the seal pack See Section 3.4.3, Adjusting the Seal Pack

# 7.3.5 Cleaning the Sample Compartment

Clean the sample compartment when:

- The sample carousels do not turn properly
- The carousel carrier does not engage

#### **Required Materials**

- Wrench, Allen, 3-mm
- Nonabrasive cleaner

#### Accessing the Sample Compartment

To access the sample compartment:

- 1. Open the sample compartment and syringe cover doors (Figure 7-8).
- 2. Remove the five carousels. Use the Door is Open dialog box to move the carousel carrier to the "A" position (<u>Section 3.4.4, Loading Carousels</u>).




Figure 7-17 Accessing the Sample Compartment

- Open the solvent delivery tray and solvent conditioning tray access doors (Figure 7-17).
- Use the Allen wrench to loosen the two sample compartment front panel screws (Figure 7-17).

5. Pull the sample compartment front panel towards you to remove the panel.

### **Cleaning the Sample Compartment**

To clean the sample compartment:




Figure 7-18 Sample Compartment Components

1. Push down about 1/4-inch on the spring-retaining pin in the center of the carousel carrier to loosen the carousel carrier (Figure 7-18).

- 2. Slide the carousel carrier toward the front of the unit, then remove the carousel carrier (Figure 7-18).
- Remove the carousel floor plate and clean with a non-abrasive cleaner (Figure 7-18).
- 4. Reinstall the carousel floor plate.
- 5. Push down about 1/4-inch on the spring-retaining pin in the center of the carousel carrier to reinstall the carousel carrier.
- 6. Reinstall the sample compartment front panel with the two sample compartment front panel screws.

# 7.4 Updating the Software Version Using the Floppy Disk Drive

You can update the software version on your 2695 Separations Module by copying the software from a Waters 2695 Firmware Update Disk to the system ROM chips using the diskette drive on the front panel of the unit.

**Note:** If you have not used the floppy disk drive for a long period of time, Waters recommends that you exercise the drive mechanics before performing the software update procedure. Exercise the drive by exporting a separation method or sample set to a formatted floppy disk, then importing the same method or sample set (see <u>Section 6.5,</u> <u>Using the Disk Drive</u>).

#### Procedure



**Attention:** To prevent a mandatory service call to replace ROM chips, make sure that you do not power off the 2695 Separations Module during the software update procedure.

To update the software version:

- 1. Insert the Waters 2695 Firmware Update Disk into the floppy disk drive on the front panel of the 2695 Separations Module.
- 2. Power on the 2695 Separations Module.
- 3. When the startup diagnostics are complete, you are prompted to proceed with the update.
- 4. Select Yes, then follow additional prompts as required. The update procedure takes about 15 minutes. *Do not power off the unit during the update procedure.*

# Chapter 8 Diagnostics and Troubleshooting

This chapter describes how to troubleshoot the 2695 Separations Module with the help of user-initiated diagnostics and recommended troubleshooting procedures. This chapter covers:

- Safety and handling
- Using the error log
- Performing diagnostics
- Troubleshooting

**Note:** For information about startup diagnostics, see the <u>"Startup Diagnostics"</u> discussion in <u>Chapter 3</u>.

#### **Proper Operating Procedures**

To keep your Waters 2695 Separations Module running optimally, follow the operating procedures and guidelines described in <u>Chapter 3, Preparing the 2695 Separations</u> <u>Module for Operation</u>.

#### **Spare Parts**

Refer to <u>Appendix B, Spare Parts</u>, for spare parts information. Parts not included in Appendix B are not recommended for replacement by the customer.

#### **Contacting Waters Technical Service**

If you encounter any problems performing diagnostics or troubleshooting the 2695 Separations Module, contact Waters Technical Service at 800 252-4752, *U.S. and Canadian customers only.* Other customers, call your local Waters subsidiary or Technical Service Representative, or contact Waters corporate headquarters in Milford, Massachusetts (U.S.A.) for assistance.

# 8.1 Safety and Handling

When you troubleshoot the 2695 Separations Module, keep the following safety considerations in mind:



Attention: To prevent circuit damage due to static charges, do not touch integrated circuit chips or other components that do not specifically require manual adjustment.



*Caution:* To avoid the possibility of electric shock, never disconnect an electrical assembly while power is applied to the 2695 Separations Module. Once power is turned off, wait approximately ten seconds before you disconnect an assembly.



**Caution:** To prevent injury, always observe good laboratory practices when you handle solvents, change tubing, or operate the 2695 Separations Module. Know the physical and chemical properties of the solvents you use. Refer to the Material Safety Data Sheets for the solvents in use.



*Caution:* To avoid the possibility of electric shock, do not open the power supply cover. The power supply does not contain user-serviceable parts.

# 8.2 Using the Error Log

Use the Error Log to view the status messages and warnings that the 2695 Separations Module has generated. You can view or print the status messages and warnings to help you keep track of possible problems that occurred during system operation.

Press the Log screen key in the Main screen to display the Error Log screen (Figure 8-1).

The Error Log screen displays the last 10 messages in chronological order. The most recent message is at the bottom of the screen. Use the Page key or the up arrow key to view older messages. The Error Log can save up to one hundred messages.

Press the **Refresh** screen key to display any new messages logged since the screen was last accessed.

Press the **Print** screen key to enter a file name for the error log (<u>Figure 8-2</u>). Use the file name to print the file to a printer or to a diskette.

# 8.3 Performing Main Diagnostics

You can perform many diagnostic operations from two front-panel diagnostics screens:

- **Diagnostics screen** Accesses certain system status information and diagnostics and performance tests for the solvent management system and the sample management system; also accesses utilities for Waters Technical Service representatives.
- Other Diagnostics screen Accesses diagnostics that allow the user to perform maintenance procedures and control optional devices (such as the column heater, sample heater/cooler, inline degasser, and bar code reader).

To access the Diagnostics screen, press the **Diag** screen key in the Main screen. The Diagnostics screen appears (Figure 8-3).

# **Diagnostics Screen Fields**

The fields in the Diagnostics screen include:

- Transducers fields Display the current pressure readings for the three transducers.
- Lifetime Counters fields Display total values for the indicated parameters.

The following sections describe the diagnostics accessed from the Diagnostics screen keys.

# 8.3.1 Priming the Plunger Seal Wash Pump

The Prime Plunger Seal Wash Test automatically primes the solvent management system plunger seal wash pump. Perform this test if there is a lack of flow in the plunger seal wash system or if you are changing the seal wash solvent. If required, use an intermediate solvent to prevent immiscibility or precipitate problems when changing solvents.

#### **Required Materials**

- · Seal wash solution
- Tubing adapter (in Startup Kit)
- Syringe (use only if no solvent is in the seal wash pump)

To prime the plunger seal wash:

- 1. Ensure that the plunger seal wash supply line (labeled "Inlet") is in the seal wash solvent bottle and that the plunger seal wash waste line (clear) is in an appropriate waste container.
- 2. Attach the tubing adapter (in Startup Kit) to the syringe.
- 3. Fill the syringe with the seal wash solution, then connect the syringe assembly to the seal wash inlet tube.
- Press the Prime SealWsh screen key in the Diagnostics screen. The Prime Seal Wash dialog box appears (<u>Figure 8-4</u>).

- 5. Press **Start** to begin the seal wash procedure. Push on the syringe plunger to push seal wash solvent through the system.
- 6. When seal wash solvent flows out of the seal wash waste tube, press the Halt screen key. (The seal wash pump prime will time-out after 15 minutes if the test is not halted.)
- 7. Press Close to return to the Diagnostics screen.

For more information about priming the plunger seal wash pump, see <u>Section 3.3.3,</u> <u>Priming the Plunger Seal-Wash Pump</u>.

# 8.3.2 Performing the Compression Check

The compression check:

- · Automatically compresses the solvent in the sample loop and syringe
- Checks for leaks
- Determines the compressibility of the solvent in the system.

Perform a compression check if you suspect seal pack leakage. Symptoms of seal pack leakage include:

- Dripping in the sample chamber
- · Abnormally low system pressure

#### **Procedure**

To perform the Compression Check diagnostic:

1. Install on the red outlet line a restrictor that generates at least 500 psi of backpressure when the solvent flow is 3.0 mL/min or less.

Note: If you leave a column inline during this test, you do not need a restrictor.

- 2. Connect the restrictor outlet to a waste line.
- Press the Comp Chk screen key in the Diagnostics screen. The Compression Check dialog box appears (<u>Figure 8-5</u>).

The fields in the Compression Check dialog box are:

- Compressed Volume field Displays the compressed volume of the sample loop in µL.
- Delta Decay Pressure field Displays the change in the decay pressure in psi.
- Final Pressure field Displays sample loop pressure after the diagnostic is completed.

See <u>Table 3-4</u> for the correct parameter settings.

 Press the Start screen key to begin the Compression Check diagnostic. When the test is complete, the Compression Check screen either displays values in the Compressed Volume, Delta Decay, and Final Pressure fields (indicating a successful test) or a Fail status.

#### **Compression Check Failure**

If the Compression Check fails:

- Verify that the parameters entered for the test are correct (see <u>Table 3-4</u>).
- Confirm that the appropriate solvent is being used, and that the solvent has been properly conditioned.
- Visually check the syringe for bubbles. Confirm that the syringe is secure.
- Adjust the seals (see <u>Section 8.3.4, Adjusting the Seals</u>).
- Inspect the sample chamber for dripping.
- Confirm that there are no leaks in the Sample Management fluidic path (compression/ferrule connections, valves, tubing).
- Purge the sample management system (see <u>Section 3.4.1, Purging the Sample</u> <u>Management System</u>). Performing Main Diagnostics 237

# 8.3.3 Priming the Needle Wash Pump

The Prime Needle Wash Pump procedure automatically primes the needle wash system and homes the needle into the stream position. Perform this procedure if:

- · There is a lack of flow in the needle wash system
- You are changing the seal wash solvent
- There is a needle sensor malfunction

To prime the needle wash:

- 1. Ensure that the needle wash supply line (green) is in the solvent bottle and that the waste line (yellow) is in an appropriate waste container.
- Press the Prime NdlWash screen key in the Diagnostics screen. The Prime Needle Wash dialog box appears (Figure 8-6).

- Press the Start screen key to begin the needle wash. If the solvent does not flow out of the waste line within 30 seconds, press Start again. If the solvent still does not flow out of the waste line:
  - · Check the sample chamber for dripping from the injector
  - Check if fluid is being withdrawn from the needle wash reservoir

#### 8.3.4 Adjusting the Seals

The Adjust Seals procedure automatically adjusts and optimizes the vertical needle port position in the seal of the autoinjector.

#### **Required Materials**

- Restrictor or union with pin plug (in Startup Kit)
- Methanol, 100%, degassed or sparged

Before you adjust the seals, ensure that:

- The sample management system has been purged at least twice.
- The solvent is degassed (or sparged) 100% methanol (or another compatible solvent).
- You have removed your column to avoid damaging it from a pressure pulse of approximately 1000 psi (69 bar, 6894 kPa).
- You have installed on the red outlet line a restrictor that generates at least 1000 psi of backpressure at a flow rate of less than 3.0 mL/min.

**Note:** To attain sufficient backpressure without a column, you may need to partially cap the red line with a union and fitting plug assembly. Collect solvent runoff in an appropriate waste container.

**Note:** High-resistance restrictors (>2000 psi @ 1 mL/min) may cause this test to take longer and may result in a Missing Restrictor Error.

#### Procedure

To adjust the seals:

 Press the Adjust Seals screen key in the Diagnostics screen. The Adjust Seals dialog box appears (Figure 8-7).

2. Press the Start screen key to begin the test.

When the test is complete, the screen displays:

- Pass or Fail status
- Current and previous seal data

Check that the values of the Adjust Seals parameters are within the acceptable ranges shown in <u>Table 8-2</u>. A Seal Geometry Error may appear if:

- · Adjust Seals parameter values are not in the acceptable range
- Air bubbles occur in the sample management system. (If so, purge the sample management system and try again.)
- Solvent is not properly degassed or sparged (but air bubbles are not visible).

#### Adjust Seals Failure

If the Adjust Seals test fails:

- 1. Make sure that:
  - Flow rate for the Adjust Seals test was set to 1.0 to 1.5 mL/min
  - The 100% methanol was properly degassed and filtered
  - Degassing or sparging was enabled
- 2. If all of the above criteria were met, go to step 3.

If any of the above criteria were not met, take the appropriate action, then repeat the Adjust Seals test. If the test fails again, go to step 3.

- 3. Replace the restrictor in the red outlet line with a pin plug.
- 4. Ramp system pressure up to 4500 psi. Hold this pressure for 2 minutes (to reenergize the seals).
- 5. Repeat the Adjust Seals diagnostic.
- 6. If the test fails again:
  - a. Stop solvent flow.
  - b. Monitor the displayed pressure value (value should be close to zero and be stable).
  - c. Contact Waters Technical Service.

# 8.3.5 Service Utilities Diagnostics

Service Utilities diagnostics are for use by Waters Technical Service representatives only. These utilities are password-protected. For information about contacting Waters Technical Service, see the discussion on this topic at the beginning of this chapter.

# 8.4 Performing Other Diagnostics




Figure 8-8 Other Diagnostics Screen

To display the Other Diagnostics screen (<u>Figure 8-8</u>), press the Other Tests screen key in the Diagnostics screen (see <u>Figure 8-3</u>). Some of the tests and maintenance procedures that appear in the scroll box in this screen correspond to the options that you have installed on your Separations Module.

  - V1 (Sample loop valve)
  - V2 (Syringe valve)
  - V3 (Waste valve)
  - V4 (Needle wash valve)

The Motors and Valves diagnostic software checks the parameter values that you enter to ensure that the values are within appropriate limits to protect the system and column.

To perform the Motors and Valves diagnostic, select **Motors and valves** in the Other Diagnostics screen, then press the OK screen key. The Motors and Valves diagnostic screen appears (Figure 8-9).

- Current positions of the needle and syringe
- Current positions of the GPV and the V1–V4 valves
- The On/Off status of the Needle Wash pump

#### **Controlling Motors**




Figure 8-10 Sensor Diagnostic Screen

# 8.4.3 Performing the Static Leak Test

The Static Leak ("ramp and decay") test:

- Performs a solvent pressure ramp up
- Monitors the pressure decay in the solvent delivery system to determine if the inlet check valves, tubing, fittings, or plunger seals are faulty

Perform the Static Leak test whenever you:

- Suspect leakage in the inlet check valves or plunger seals.
- Perform maintenance on the solvent management system.
- Replace fluidic path fittings.

#### **Static Leak Test Failure**

- Check for obvious leaks.
- Check that the Prime/Vent valve is closed.
- Check that the degasser is set to On.
- Make sure compression fittings and head nuts are tight.
- Make sure you used the appropriate solvent (methanol or water is recommended).
- If necessary, ensure a good seal around the plunger and head surface by flowing at high pressure before rerunning the test. For example, install a restrictor sufficient to achieve 4000 to 4500 psi backpressue at a flow rate of 0.5mL/min.
- Repeat the Static Leak test.

#### **Continued Failure of the Static Leak Test**

If the Static Leak Test continues to fail:

- Ensure that the degasser is set to the On mode.
- Perform a wet prime for 10 minutes at 1.0 mL/min using methanol with a restrictor connected to achieve 4000 to 4500 psi backpressure. Performing a wet prime increases the stroke length to its maximum length.
- After 7 to 8 minutes of wet priming, inspect the plumbing and fittings for leaks. Use thermal paper as a means of detecting leaks, which turns dark on contact with methanol. Repair any leaks.
- Remove the resistor, replacing it with a pin plug and rerun the Static Leak test.

# 8.4.4 Performing the Valve Leak Test

The Valve Leak test:

- Tests the Sample Inlet Valve (V1) and Syringe Valve (V2) of the Sample Management System (see <u>Figure 1-3</u>)
- Tests the upper and lower side of the needle seal pack for pressure leaks

Perform the Valve Leak test whenever you:

- Suspect leakage in the sample management valves or upper and lower needle seal pack
- Perform maintenance on the sample management system

#### **Required Materials**

- Pin plug
- Wrenches, 5/16-inch, open-end, two
- Waste container

#### Procedure

#### To perform the Valve Leak test:

 Select Valve leak test in the Other Diagnostics screen, then press the OK screen key. The Valve Leak Test screen appears (<u>Figure 8-13</u>).

# 8.4.5 Performing the Head Removal and Replacement Utility




Figure 8-15 I/O Diagnostics Screen




Figure 8-16 Keypad Diagnostic Screen

# 8.4.10 Performing the Inline Degasser Test

The Inline Degasser test allows you to test the proper functioning of the inline degasser by ramping down the vacuum pressure in the inline degasser and then measuring the rate at which the pressure increases. This test takes approximately 15 minutes to complete.

The vacuum pressure can be monitored by connecting a chart recorder to the Chart Out outputs on the back panel of the Separations Module.

To perform the Inline Degasser Ramp and Decay test:

- Select Degasser in the Other Diagnostics screen, then press OK. The inline Degasser Test screen appears (Figure 8-18).
- 2. Press the Start screen key to begin the test. During the test, the system:

### 8.4.11 Performing the Sample Heater/Cooler Test

The Sample Heater/Cooler test allows you to test the proper functioning of the sample heater/cooler module by ramping down the temperature in the sample heater/cooler and then measuring the rate at which the temperature rises.

The sample heater/cooler temperature can be monitored by connecting a chart recorder to the Chart Out terminals on the back panel of the 2695 Separations Module.

- Remove all carousels and vials from the sample compartment.
- Check that the column heater (if installed) is not in use.

- 4. When the procedure is finished:
  - The Defrost Sample Heater/Cooler screen indicates that the procedure has ended.
  - You are prompted to close the sample compartment door.

## 8.4.13 Performing the Column Heater Test

The Column Heater test allows you to test the proper functioning of the column heater by increasing the temperature in the column heater.

The column heater temperature can be monitored by connecting a chart recorder to the Chart Out terminals on the back panel of the 2695 Separations Module.

Before you perform the Column Heater test, make sure that:

- The sample heater/cooler is not in use.
- The sample compartment temperature is between 18 and 28 °C.

**Note:** To ensure the accuracy of this test, do not open the column heater door during the test.

To perform the Column Heater diagnostic:

- Select Column heater in the Other Diagnostics screen, then press OK. The Column Heater test screen appears (<u>Figure 8-21</u>).

- The column heater temperature ramps up (for about 8 minutes).
- The system measures the increase in temperature.
- 3. When the test is finished, the Column Heater Test screen displays:
  - Pass/Fail test status
  - Change in temperature

### 8.4.14 Rebuilding the Injector Valves

The Rebuild Injector Valves utility allows you to rebuild and test:

- V1 Sample loop valve
- V2 Syringe valve

This utility allows you to drive the valve motor forward and reverse to remove and replace valve components. Refer to the Injector Valve Rebuild Kit for information on rebuilding the injector valves.



# 8.4.15 Turning Off the Gradient Proportioning Valve (GPV)

Turning off the gradient proportioning valve (GPV) is useful when you are replacing an inlet check valve cartridge (see <u>Section 7.2.6, Replacing an Inlet Check Valve Cartridge</u>).




Figure 8-23 Turn Off GPV Utility

To turn off the gradient proportioning valve, select **Turn Off GPV** in the Other Diagnostics screen, then press **OK**. The screen notifies you about the current state of the GPV (<u>Figure 8-23</u>).

# 8.4.16 Creating a GPV Test Method

The Create GPV Test Method utility allows you to create a gradient proportioning valve test method that can be used during the Operational Qualification of the 2695 Separations Module. You can delete this method when you complete the Operational Qualification, and then rerun the utility if you need to requalify the operation of the 2695 Separations Module.




Figure 8-24 GPV Test Separation Method

To create a GPV test method, select **Create GPV Test** in the Other Diagnostics screen, then press **OK**. The screen notifies you about the GPV Test separation method (Figure 8-24).

# 8.4.17 Viewing the Firmware Checksum

The Firmware Checksum utility allows you to test the installation of the firmware by displaying and checking the checksum value.

To view the firmware checksum, select **Firmware checksum** in the Other Diagnostics screen. The checksum and its accuracy are displayed (Figure 8-25).

This section provides information for troubleshooting the Separations Module. It covers:

- · General troubleshooting hints
- Chromatography troubleshooting
- Hardware troubleshooting for the:
  - System
  - Solvent Management System
  - Sample Management System

**Note:** Refer to <u>Section 8.1, Safety and Handling</u>, for information on safety and handling considerations while you troubleshoot the Separations Module.

# 8.5.1 General Troubleshooting Hints

#### **Basic Troubleshooting Steps**

There are six basic steps for performing system troubleshooting:

- 1. Step back and look at the system. Check the simple things first. Is something obvious causing the problem (for example, is an instrument unplugged or improperly connected)?
- 2. Compare current system operation with the way the system operated before the problem started. To help you identify normal operating conditions:
  - a. Record a map of your LC system (tubing and electrical connections).
  - b. Keep a daily log.
  - c. Run test chromatograms regularly.

Step 2 points out the importance of keeping track of system parameters and the results of your chromatography during normal operation. Troubleshooting is easier if you know the typical conditions when the system is operating correctly.

For example, if your system usually runs at *n* psi with a certain method, is the system pressure currently in the same range, or drastically higher (possibly caused by a plug) or lower (possibly caused by a leak)? Are pressure fluctuations in the same pressure range as during normal operation?

When your system is installed, and each time you develop a new method, fill out a Normal Operation Checklist to keep a record of system conditions during normal operation.

- Identify in the order listed below the symptom that varies from normal system operation:
  - a. System pressure (high, low, erratic)
  - b. Baseline (fluidic-path-related or detector-electronics-related)
  - c. Changes in peak retention time (incorrect or changing over time)
  - d. Loss of peak resolution
  - e. Abnormal peak shape (smaller than expected, broad, tailing, and so on)
  - f. Incorrect qualitative/quantitative results
- 4. For each isolated symptom, identify a list of suspected causes. For suggested troubleshooting procedures, see:
  - <u>Section 8.5.2, Troubleshooting Chromatography Problems</u>
  - <u>Section 8.5.3, Troubleshooting Hardware Problems</u>
- 5. Run the performance tests for each chromatographic instrument to quickly determine if a problem exists with a particular instrument.

6. Refer to the troubleshooting information in the troubleshooting tables of this chapter. The troubleshooting tables are organized according to the parameters in step 3 and allow you to narrow down the possible causes of a symptom and find suggested corrective actions.

If you determine that there is a problem related to another system component, refer to the appropriate operator manual.

#### When to Call Waters Technical Service

Many problems with a Waters 2695 Separations Module can be easily corrected by the user. However, if you cannot correct a condition, you can contact Waters Technical Service at 800 252-4752, U.S. and Canadian customers only. Other customers, call your local Waters subsidiary or Technical Service Representative, or contact Waters corporate headquarters in Milford, MAssachusetts (U.S.A.) for assistance.

# 8.5.2 Troubleshooting Chromatography Problems



*Caution:* To prevent injury, always observe good laboratory practices when you handle solvents, change tubing, or operate the Separations Module. Know the physical and chemical properties of the solvents you use. Refer to the Material Safety Data Sheets for the solvents in use.

<u>Table 8-9</u> lists chromatographic symptoms, possible causes, and suggested corrective actions for the Separations Module.

Before you use <u>Table 8-9</u>, read <u>Section 8.5.1</u>, <u>General Troubleshooting Hints</u>, and follow the basic troubleshooting steps to isolate the cause of the chromatographic symptom.

# C.1 Introduction

### **Clean Solvents**

Clean solvents provide:

- Reproducible results
- Operation with minimal instrument maintenance

A dirty solvent can cause:

- · Baseline noise and drift
- · Blockage of the solvent filters with particulate matter

#### **Solvent Quality**

Use HPLC-grade solvents to ensure the best possible results. Filter solvents through 0.45-µm filters before use. Solvents distilled in glass generally maintain their purity from lot to lot; use them to ensure the best possible results.

#### **Preparation Checklist**

The following solvent preparation guidelines help to ensure stable baselines and good resolution:

- Filter solvents with a 0.45-µm filter.
- Degas and/or sparge the solvent.
- Stir the solvent.
- Keep solvents in a location that is free from drafts and shock.

#### Water

Use water only from a high-quality water purification system. If the water system does not provide filtered water, filter it through a 0.45- $\mu$ m membrane filter before use.

#### **Buffers**

When you use buffers, dissolve salts first, adjust the pH, then filter to remove insoluble material.

### Tetrahydrofuran (THF)

When using unstabilized THF, ensure that your solvent is fresh. Previously opened bottles of THF contain peroxide contaminants, which cause baseline drift.

**Caution:** THF contaminants (peroxides) are potentially explosive if concentrated or taken to dryness.

# C.2 Solvent Compatibility

The Waters 2695 Separations Module is constructed of high-quality (316) stainless steel components that, with some minor restrictions, can be used with all solvents. This section lists the solvents that have and have not been approved for use with the Separations Module.

#### **Solvents to Avoid**

The following solvents will attack or dissolve the Teflon AF tubing in the PerformancePLUS Inline degasser:

- All perfluorosolvents produced by 3M under the trade name Fluorinert<sup>™</sup>
- All perfluorosolvents produced by Ausimont under the trade names Galden<sup>™</sup> and Fomblin<sup>™</sup>



*Caution:* Damage to the degassing tubing from exposure to perfluorosolvents is immediate and irreversible.

Long-term *static* exposure to halide salts (for example, fluoride, bromide, chloride, and iodide) will cause pitting and corrosion of stainless steel parts. When using these salts, flush your system thoroughly with water if the pump will be idle for more than two days. Refer to <u>Section 4.4.2, Performing a Wet Prime</u>.

### **Solvents to Use**

Materials of construction used in the Separations Module are nonreactive with most acids, bases, salts, and organic solvents.

The solvents listed in <u>Table C-1</u> through <u>Table C-4</u> have been approved for use with the Separations Module. These include salts, acids and bases in concentrations up to 1 M (unless otherwise noted), and organic solvents in concentrations of up to 100% (unless otherwise noted). Higher concentrations can be used in many instances.

Information on the use of a specific solvent or concentration that is not listed in this manual can be obtained by contacting Waters.

Before you change solvents, refer to <u>Table C-5</u> to determine the miscibility of the solvents to be used. When you change solvents, be aware that:

- Changes involving two miscible solvents may be made directly. Changes involving two solvents that are not totally miscible (for example, from chloroform to water), require an intermediate solvent (such as methanol).
- Temperature affects solvent miscibility. If you are running a high-temperature application, consider the effect of the higher temperature on solvent solubility.
- Buffers dissolved in water may precipitate when mixed with organic solvents.

When you switch from a strong buffer to an organic solvent, flush the buffer out of the system with distilled water before you add the organic solvent.

#### How to Use Miscibility Numbers (M-Numbers)

Use miscibility numbers (M-numbers) to predict the miscibility of a liquid with a standard solvent (see <u>Table C-5</u>).

To predict the miscibility of two liquids, subtract the smaller M-number value from the larger M-number value.

- If the difference between the two M-numbers is 15 or less, the two liquids are miscible in all proportions at 15 °C.
- A difference of 16 indicates a critical solution temperature between 25 and 75 °C, with 50 °C as the optimal temperature.

• If the difference is 17 or greater, the liquids are immiscible or their critical solution temperature is above 75 °C.

Some solvents prove immiscible with solvents at both ends of the lipophilicity scale. These solvents receive a dual M-number:

- The first number, always lower than 16, indicates the degree of miscibility with highly lipophilic solvents.
- The second number applies to the opposite end of the scale. A large difference between these two numbers indicates a limited range of miscibility.

For example, some fluorocarbons are immiscible with all the standard solvents and have M-numbers of 0 and 32. Two liquids with dual M-numbers are usually miscible with each other.

A liquid is classified in the M-number system by testing for miscibility with a sequence of standard solvents. A correction term of 15 units is then either added or subtracted from the cutoff point for miscibility.

### C.4 Buffered Solvents

When using a buffer, use a good quality reagent and filter it through a 0.45-µm filter.

Do not leave the buffer stored in the system after use. Flush all fluidic pathways with HPLC-quality water before shutting down the system and leave distilled water in the system (flush with 90% HPLC-quality water:10% methanol for shutdowns scheduled to be more than one day). Flush using a minimum of 15 mL for sparge-equipped units, and a minimum of 45 mL for inline vacuum degasser-equipped units.

### C.5 Head Height

Position the solvent reservoirs at a level above the Separations Module or on top of the Separations Module (with adequate spill protection).

### C.6 Solvent Viscosity

Generally, viscosity is not important when you are operating with a single solvent or under low pressure. However when you are running a gradient, the viscosity changes that occur as the solvents are mixed in different proportions can result in pressure changes during the run. For example, a 1:1 mixture of water and methanol produces twice the pressure of either water or methanol alone.

### C.7 Mobile Phase Solvent Degassing

Mobile phase difficulties account for 70% or more of all liquid chromatographic problems. Using degassed solvents is important, especially at wavelengths below 220 nm. Degassing provides:

- Stable baselines and enhanced sensitivity
- · Reproducible retention times for eluting peaks
- Reproducible injection volumes for quantitation
- Stable pump operation

This section presents information on the solubility of gases, solvent degassing methods, and solvent degassing considerations.

### C.7.1 Gas Solubility

Only a finite amount of gas can be dissolved in a given volume of liquid. This amount depends on:

- The chemical affinity of the gas for the liquid.
- The temperature of the liquid.
- The pressure applied to the liquid.

Changes in the composition, temperature, or pressure of the mobile phase can lead to outgassing.

### **Effects of Intermolecular Forces**

Nonpolar gases ( $N_2$ ,  $O_2$ ,  $CO_2$ , He) are more soluble in nonpolar solvents than in polar solvents. Generally, a gas is most soluble in a solvent whose intermolecular attractive forces are similar to those in the gas ("like dissolves like").

### **Effects of Temperature**

Temperature affects the solubility of gases. If the heat of solution is exothermic, the solubility of the gas decreases when you heat the solvent. If the heat of solution is endothermic, the solubility increases when you heat the solvent. For example, the solubility of He in  $H_2O$  decreases with an increase in temperature, but the solubility of He in benzene increases with an increase in temperature.

#### **Effects of Partial Pressure**

The mass of gas dissolved in a given volume of solvent is proportional to the partial pressure of the gas in the vapor phase of the solvent. If you decrease the partial pressure of the gas, the amount of that gas in solution also decreases.

### C.7.2 Solvent Degassing Methods

You can degas solvents by either of the following methods:

- Sparging with helium
- Vacuum degassing

#### Sparging

Sparging removes gases from solution by displacing dissolved gases in the solvent with a less soluble gas, usually helium. Well-sparged solvent improves pump performance. Helium sparging brings the solvent to a state of equilibrium, which may be maintained by slow sparging or by keeping a blanket of helium over the solvent. Blanketing inhibits reabsorption of atmospheric gases.

Note: Sparging may change the composition of mixed solvents.

#### Vacuum Degassing

The inline vacuum degasser operates on the principle of Henry's Law to remove dissolved gases from the solvent. According to Henry's Law, the mole fraction of a gas dissolved in a liquid is proportional to the partial pressure of that gas in the vapor phase above the liquid. If the partial pressure of a gas on the surface of the liquid is reduced, for example, by evacuation, then a proportional amount of that gas comes out of solution. Refer to the Vacuum Degassing discussion below and to the <u>"PerformancePLUS Inline Degasser"</u> discussion in <u>Section 1.5</u>.

Note: Vacuum degassing may change the composition of mixed solvents.

### C.7.3 Solvent Degassing Considerations

Select the most efficient degassing operation for your application. To remove dissolved gas quickly, consider the following.

### Sparging

Helium sparging gives stable baselines and better detection sensitivity than sonication, and prevents reabsorption of atmospheric gases. Use this method to retard oxidation when you are using THF or other peroxide-forming solvents.

### Vacuum Degassing

The longer a solvent is exposed to a vacuum, the more dissolved gases are removed. Two factors affect the amount of time the solvent is exposed to the vacuum:

- Flow rate At low flow rates, most of the dissolved gas is removed as the solvent passes through the vacuum chamber. At higher flow rates, lesser amounts of gas per unit volume of solvent are removed.
- Surface area of the degassing membrane The length of the degassing membrane is fixed in each vacuum chamber. To increase the length of membrane, you can connect two or more vacuum chambers in series.

The inline degasser is available as an option or factory-installed in the 2695 XE model. Refer to the <u>"PerformancePLUS Inline Degasser"</u> discussion in <u>Section 1.5</u>.

### **UV Cutoffs for Common Solvents**

<u>Table C-6</u> shows the UV cutoff (the wavelength at which the absorbance of the solvent is equal to 1 AU) for some common chromatographic solvents. Operating at a wavelength near or below the cutoff increases baseline noise due to the absorbance of the solvent.
